### GENERAL NEWS.

The senate bill for the redemption of the silver coinage of the Hawaiian islands and its recoinage into United States coin, was passed after an hour's debate Wednesday.

The senate committee on the Philippines Thursday took favorable action on the amendment to the sundry civil appropriation bill suggested by Senator Lodge, appropriating \$2,500,000 for the purchase of draught animals for the Philippines.

The coal situation in Toledo, O., has reached the point where a physician's certificate is required by dealers before they will sell even a ton of coal. The certificate must show that there is illness in the home of the would-be purchaser, and that coal is necessary as a safeguard for the patient.

The Clark corporation has agreed to buy from Harriman 300 miles of road, part of the Oregon Short Line, running southwest from Salt Lake to a point in Southeastern Nevada. This deal is to be closed in New York within a few days. By means of it Senator Clark gets rid of a parallel line which Harriman was arranging to build.

Lieutenant Robert Peary, the Arctic explorer, declared at the conclusion of his lecture upon his last journey to the far north, delivered before the Philadelphia Geographical Society, that, provided anyone would place \$150,000 at his disposal, he would be willing to undertake another expedition next summer in a final endeavor to reach the pole.

In New York the price of coal has been advanced to \$9.50 as a minimum and some anthracite has been sold as high as \$12.50. A number of large dealers have consulted over the situation and it is probable that a meeting will be held today to promulgate a schedule of retail prices. The independent operators met in this city and agreed not to sell coal at less than \$10 a ton to the dealers. The coal roads, it was said by some of their officials, will continue to sell at \$5 a ton.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

St. Lawrence Island has been made a reindeer preserve for Alaska.

Oregon was the lowest bidder for the care of the Alaska insane.

A new hospital costing \$60,000, is to be erected at Vancouver barracks.

There is reported to be an epidemic of smallpox in the vicinity of Thurston, 10 miles east of Eugene.

Fred A. Bancroft has been named by President Roosevelt to succeed A. E. Crossman as postmaster of Portland.

Owing to the unusual Eastern immigration in Linn county, the schools of Lebanon are over-crowded and another teacher has been added.

Governor Isabel, of the State of Hermosillo, Mexico, has established a patrol around Mazatlan and will take heroic measures to exterminate the plague.

The wreck of the Norwegian bark Prince Arthur is now on the beach at Ozetta, Wash. Six bodies have been found on the beach near the wreck.

W. T. Bunnay, the county treasurer of Inyo county, California, has not been heard from since December 26. The vault cannot be opened and the condition of the treasury is not known.

The irrigation company interests which now dominate the Portland Board of Trade, have resumed their war against Moore and now declare that the accounts of the ex-secretary are short.

A white rust is an unexplained "disease" of English and German galvanized iron that has developed within a year or two.

## TO FIX COUNTY LINE

### UNION AND UMATILLA TO BE PROPERLY BOUNDED

Settlers at the Summit of the Mountains Desire Fixed Line—Voters and Taxpayers Should Be Canvassed Before Law is Passed.

The bill to be introduced by Senator Pierce, fixing the boundary line between Union and Umatilla counties will form no small part of Umatilla county legislation at the coming session.

In the pioneer day, when a stage road and pack trail were the only indications of civilization on the summit of the mountains, it did not matter where the line was, nor whether a tree was blazed or not, for it did not enter into the question of county government.

But since the summit of the mountains has been settled up and the questions of citizenship, taxation and legal residence have entered into the issue, it is now very necessary to know where that line is.

At Kamela and Meacham there are perhaps 20 voters who reside in the timber near the summit, and who take their choice in voting at either place.

Assessors find great difficulty in locating property in the right county and the movement to fix a permanent line on the mountain meets with hearty approval from everybody concerned.

The summit of the mountain is so uneven that it is difficult to follow the high ridge of the range. Deep canyons run high up from either side, causing the true summit to zigzag back and forth a great deal, and altogether it is a very antiquated method of describing the boundary of a county.

The settlers near the summit are deeply interested in locating the line, as it makes a great deal of difference to many of them residing near the line, where they are placed in the final establishment of the boundary.

Many of them transact business in Pendleton and claim residence in Umatilla county. They market their wood in this city and are desirous of continuing in this county. A line drawn straight through the mountain settlements, without regard to the local situations there would work a hardship on those settlers who may have a choice in selecting the county in which to live.

A most thorough canvass of the situation should be made before a bill is drawn, in order to deal justly with the old settlers of that mountain district.

It would be a great injustice to settlers, or any small number of them to place them in Union county, while their only market and nearest trading point is Pendleton. Section lines should be correctly located, and every individual owning property along the proposed line should be given a hearing before the matter is permanently settled.

### WANTS HER FREEDOM.

#### Isabelle Taylor Accuses Her Husband of Mistreating Her.

Isabelle Taylor has filed papers with County Clerk W. D. Chamberlain, asking that she be granted a divorce from Moses Taylor, Mr. and Mrs. Taylor are residents of the Athena neighborhood, where they have lived for years. The suit cites as grounds upon which she should have a divorce that Moses Taylor has repeatedly mistreated her and accused her of being insane.

This treatment she resents as being untrue and unjust. She says that they were married in Ontario in 1875, 27 years ago, and eight children were born to them. Defendant, according to the complaint, would accuse plaintiff of being insane and tell her that he would have her committed to the asylum.

a bedpost and inflicting bruises upon her body.

The petition states that defendant is worth \$74,000 and asks the court to give her title to one-third of this property, beside \$12,000 as her dower. Baily & McCourt are attorneys for plaintiff.

### Freaks of Jersey Justice.

Miss Laura Bigger, Dr. C. C. Henrick and Samuel Stanton were all tried at the same time on the same charge of conspiracy to gain possession of the Bennett estate. A marriage certificate alleged to be fraudulent and a certificate of the birth of a child to Laura Bigger, although it was alleged none had been born, figured in the charges. Miss Bigger goes free, both men are convicted.

Justice Gummers, at Trenton, set aside a \$5000 verdict for the killing of a 5-year-old boy, saying that a child's life was worth only \$1.
