GENERAL NEWS.

Hawaii is protesting against the senate proposition, making Molo Kai a national leper settlement.

Although Smoot is likely to be elected to the senate, public sentiment is believed to be against his admission, as he is a Mormon apostle.

Three female bandits attempted to rob a man on the streets of Denver Saturday. He resisted and was shot through the cheek by one of the women.

A special from Moab, Utah, says that a small, active volcano crater has been discovered by prospectors in the Dome plateau region near the Grand River, 20 miles north of Moab.

The negotiations between the powers regarding the method of paying the Chinese indemnity are proceeding. Washington's acceptance of the Chinese proposal to pay in silver does not meet with the cordial approval of Europe.

A would-be-assassin who has been an inmate of an insane asylum, fired at the royal procession in Madrid Saturday. He was captured and declared that he sought to kill the Duke of Gotomayor, the royal chamberlain, not King Alfonso.

Mrs. Katherine Tingley, the purple mother of Point Loma, has attacked the Los Angeles Times in a new manner. She began suit Saturday for \$75,000 damages for conspiracy against Harrison Gray Otis, editor of the Times, and its city editor and one of its reporters.

A committee of Russian journalists and literary men which had arranged for a banquet in celebration of the 20th anniversary of the publication of the first Russian newspaper, received an intimation that the plan was untimely and the end of the incident was that the police forbade the banquet.

The Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of Canada, has given notice of an application to parliament for an act of incorporation to transact and do business all over British North America, the British Isles, Europe and on the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, and on the islands and places near the same.

FOR OREGON'S GOOD

MRS. EDITH TOZIER WEATHERED'S TIMELY ADVICE.

Says Eastern Oregon Should Hasten to Place Her Exhibits Where They Will Reap Their Deserved Reward—Prophetic Expressions on the Great Exposition.

Mrs. Edith Tozier Weathered, while visiting Mrs. C. B. Wade last week, talked to a number of Pendleton's prominent citizens, relative to sending a fine wool exhibit to Mr. G. M. McKinney in Chicago, who is the general manager of the Harriman Advertising Bureau.

"This means of bringing Oregon to prominence," said Mrs. Weathered "is one of the best methods yet given our people and every portion of the state should lose no time in sending samples of resources to be put on exhibition at the permanent exhibit, 238 Clark street, Chicago.

"The railroads will take care of the samples and send them on. Eastern Oregon is letting a golden opportunity slip by to present her great wool industry. In fact," continued Mrs. Weathered, "you are not coming forward with literature from this part of the state like you promised to do. Last month I spent a week in Chicago and much of that time at the Information bureau. Here I found Mr. McKinney overwhelmed with letters—50 to 75 a day—most of this being the outcome of literature sent out through a reliable mailing bureau from his office. Hundreds of people are anxiously seeking a home in the Northwest and the coming spring will bring daily trainloads of homeseekers.

"There is no reason why Eastern Oregon will not receive its portion if you but present your claims in a practical way. Many wool men have called on Mr. McKinney for information on wool matters, and the several beautiful blankets from the Pendleton Woolen mills have indeed formed a great attraction. But our enterprise should not have to do the honors alone. Let your commercial club prepare staples of wool on attractive cards and send it on to Chicago. It is a compliment due your county. Then, too, fruit jars of wheat and other grains would bring good results."

Mrs. Weathered stated that the farmers are many of them good Missourians and "must be shown." Therefore, while the grains in sheaf are attractive, yet grains in jars make the most practical display.

Mrs. Weathered is enthusiastic over the publicity Oregon should have during the next two years and thinks the outlay of much money in a brief space of time is far more reaching and better and quicker results attained, than the same amount reaching over a period of years.

The Harriman Information Bureau should be well supplied with literature. St. Louis must have the finest exhibit ever sent out of the state—the success of our exposition demands it.

"Then the Lewis and Clark Centennial will be the great medium through which thousands will cast their lot here, not alone through those who personally visit at that time," said Mrs. Weathered, "but by the publicity the Northwest will receive by advertising the fair."
