### GENERAL NEWS.

There are now 1126 teachers and 55,000 pupils in the public schools of Porto Rico.

Five buildings were badly damaged by fire Wednesday at Piqua, O., entailing a loss of \$150,000 with only partial insurance.

An attempt is being made to have the government hold its next annual maneuvers between the army and navy on the Pacific Coast.

Fighting is in progress between the forces of the pretender and the Sultan of Morocco. The pretender is overcoming the imperial troops.

The dead body of an Italian was found Wednesday night in Jackson park, Chicago, and the police believe that they have another Mafia case to deal with.

Through an explosion Wednesday morning in the gun-cotton room of the Hamilton Powder Company's works at Northfield, B. C., seven lives were instantly extinguished, and virtually every other employe engaged about the works more or less seriously injured. The destruction of the gun-cotton room was followed by a second and equally terrific explosion in the gellignite building practically the entire plant being wrecked.

The New York Central Railroad Company is on trial in the Herkimer county court, charged with murder in the second degree. The railroad roundhouse in Herkimer was the scene of a terrific explosion in August, 1901. Five men were killed. It transpired that the railroad company had stored high explosives in the building contrary to the law and to the village ordinance. The company was indicted for violating the penal code and for murder in the second degree.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

A bill creating a labor commissioner was presented in the Oregon house Tuesday.

Portland's new charter now lacks only the signature of Governor Chamberlain to make it a law.

The main milling companies of the Pacific Coast are preparing to form a flour trust with a capital of \$2,200,000.

The steamer Gallie, lately landed 102 Koreans at Honolulu. They will be used as laborers on the sugar plantations.

Senator Frye has offered an amendment to the naval appropriation bill, appropriating \$1,500,000 for the improvement of the principal harbor on the coast of the island of Guam.

A walkout occurred in the New York brewery of Spokane, Monday morning, when all the brewers of that company walked out of the establishment. The cause of the trouble is stated to be that the company discharged one of their number.

A fatal accident occurred at the home of Lewis Doran, near Medford, January 11. Sam Duran was cleaning a shotgun. He thought it was empty, but it was not. The hammer caught and discharged the gun, the entire shot entering Grace Doran's brain.

A syndicate of Vancouver salmon canners is endeavoring to arrange for the establishment of a chain of cannery plants on the Eastern coast of Siberia. John Houston, manager of the syndicate, has started for St. Petersburg to complete arrangements with the Russian fisheries department.

There were nine deaths during the voyage of the transport Logan, which arrived Tuesday from Manila. A peculiar feature of the voyage was the absence of gambling. When the men were paid off, just after leaving Manila, the money, some \$20,000, was placed in the Logan's strong box and held until last Monday. All gambling tools found were confiscated.

## ANTI-CHILD LABOR

TEXT OF THE BILL ON THIS IMPORTANT SUBJECT.

Children Under 14 Cannot be Employed in Public Service—Children Under 16 Cannot be Caused to go to Work Before 6 A. M., Nor Work Later than seven in the Evening. The anti-child labor bill which has been prepared and will be introduced in the state senate by Senator McGinn is as follows:

Section 1.—No child under 14 years of age shall be employed in any factory, store, work shop, in or about any mine or in the telegraph, telephone or public messenger service.

Section 2.—No such child shall be employed in any work or for wages or other compensation to whomsoever payable during the hours when the public schools of the town, district or city in which he or she resides are in session.

Section 3.—Attendance at school shall be compulsory upon a child under 14 years during the whole of the school term in the city or town in which the child resides. Attendance at school shall be compulsory upon child under 15 years of age who is not employed in any lawful work.

Section 4.—No child under 16 years of age shall be employed at any work before the hour of 6 in the morning or after the hour of 7 at night, nor employed for longer than 10 hours for any one day, nor more than six days in any week. And every child under 16 years of age shall be entitled to no less than 30 minutes for meal time noon, but such meal time shall not be included as part of the work hours of the day; and every employer shall post in a conspicuous place where such minors are employed printed notice stating the maximum work hours required in one week and every day of the week from such minors.

Section 5.—No person shall employ any minor under 16 years of age, and no parent, guardian or custodian shall permit to be employed any such minor under his control who cannot read at sight and write legibly simple sentences in the English language while a school is maintained in the town or city in which such minor resides.

Section 6.—It shall be the duty of every person or corporation employing a child under the age of 16 years to keep a register in which shall be recorded the name, age, date of birth, place of residence of every child under the age of 16 years employed. And it shall be unlawful for any person or corporation to employ any child under the age of 16 years unless there is first provided and placed on file in the factory, store, work shop or mine in which such child is employed an affidavit made by the parent, stating the name, date of birth and place of the school attended by such child. The register and affidavits herein provided for, shall, on demand, be produced and shown for inspection to whomsoever the enforcement of the labor law of this state may be delegated.

The person or persons to whom the enforcement of the labor laws of this state may be delegated shall have the power to demand certificate of physical fitness from some regularly licensed physician in the case of child under 16 who may seem practically unable to perform the labor at which such child may be employed, and no child under 16 shall be employed who cannot obtain such certificate.

Section 7.—Any person or corporation who shall employ a minor contrary to the provisions of this act or who shall violate any of the provisions thereof, shall upon conviction be fined in a sum not less than \$10 nor more than \$25 for the first offense; not less than \$25 nor more than \$50 for the second offense, and be imprisoned for not less than 10 nor more than 30 days for the third and each succeeding offense.

Section 8.—Any person or guardian who permits a child to be employed in violation of the provisions of this act shall upon conviction be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$25.

### NEW COUNTY FARM.

The Chapman Farm of 130 Acres on McKay Creek to be Purchased for \$11,000.

The county court yesterday afternoon concluded to purchase a poor farm, the present quarters for the county's poor being wholly inadequate as well as expensive. The agreement is to purchase of Charles Chapman, his farm of 130 acres on McKay creek, two and a half miles from the city. It is said to be particularly well adapted to the purpose, being already under a high state of cultivation, and with many improvements that a little adaptation will render ready for the purposes for which the county invests in it. Eleven thousand dollars will be paid for the place, which is said to have nearly \$2000 worth of personal property attached. Of course, the plan that will be adopted in the management of poor farms everywhere—of requiring the inmates to labor upon the place, each according to his or her strength, mental and physical, will be followed in the management of this farm. A hospital will be built upon the place in the near future, and steps taken to put the farm to the uses it is purchased for as rapidly as possible.

Gwinn, who is secretary of the State Woolgrowers' Association, states that the most accurate available figures give something over 250,000 as the number of sheep in Umatilla county, while the annual income from them is not less than \$500,000. There are now about 3,000,000 sheep in Eastern Oregon.
