ELECTION IN FRANCE.

Socialists and Radicals Elect Over Half of the Senators.

Paris, Jan. 17.—France held an election for 98 senators on Sunday, January 4, being one-third of that body. At this election the socialists elected 34, and the radicals (similar to our populists or radical democrats) elected 18. If this represents the changed condition of public sentiment it means that the socialists will have more than one-third of the members as the terms expire, whereas they have heretofore had only about one-eighth. The radical element vote with the socialists on many measures and these two will have a majority as soon as the terms of hold-overs expire and new elections are held. This is an unprecedented gain. It amounts to almost a revolution in public affairs. It means that the French so-
