Socialism in France.
 Paris, Jan. 17.—The eight-hour system coming into force at all the French naval arsenals tomorrow is cited as an instance of the present ministry's social reform tendencies. It is considered possible that the workmen on the state railways will be encouraged to demand equally favorable treatment as the arsenal hands. The innovation has called forth vigorous remonstrances from the influential section of the community which regards the step as a further dangerous advance toward state socialism. Opposition to the scheme is also based upon the alleged indirect effects and pernicious consequences arising from increasing interference of the state between employers and employed.

DEMOCRATS ARE AFTER LEGISLATIVE REAPPORTIONMENT.
 Senator Miller Presents a Measure Designed to Upset the 1889 Gerry- mander.
 Salem, Ore., Jan. 17.—Senator Miller, democrat, of Linn, introduced a legislative reapportionment bill Thursday morning, and will strongly urge it upon the legislature on the ground that it does away with the gerrymander of 1889 and establishes equity among the several counties. By its terms there are to be 39 senators and 66 representatives and there will be one of the former for every 13,784 population, and one of the latter for every 6892, or a major fraction thereof, in each instance.

The following are each given one senator: Lane, Douglas, Coos, Jackson, Yamhill, Clackamas, Washington, Clatsop, Wasco, Umatilla, Union, Baker.
 Multnomah is to have six senators. Marion and Linn are each to have two senators.
 Joint Senatorial Districts: Polk and Lane; Josephine and Curry; Crook, Grant and Klamath; Benton, Lincoln and Tillamook; Columbia, Clackamas and Multnomah; Gilliam, Morrow, Sherman and Wheeler; Union, Umatilla and Wallawa; Baker, Lake, Harney and Malheur.
 The following will each have one representative: Coos, Josephine, Benton, Polk, Tillamook, Columbia, Grant and Crook, one; Lake, Harney and Malheur, one; Morrow and Wheeler, one; Union and Wallawa, one; Gilliam and Sherman, one.
 Senator Miller claims that the bill does away as far as possible with joint districts and that legislators will for the most part be nominated at home in county and not in state conventions. The bill, he says, has the support of fair-minded republican senators.
 It is likely that one or more changes will be necessary before the bill passes. For example, a joint senatorial district of Lane and Polk is provided for. These counties are not contiguous, and no legislative district can be made under the constitution from counties not adjacent. Senator Miller says these defects will be remedied.
 Senator McGinn Friday put in a follow-servant measure covering the provisions of the well known Alabama act. It is the senator's opinion that the Virginia act, which was fully discussed in Governor Chamberlain's message, and was approved by him, is better and he will probably change his measure to accord with it.
 A joint resolution to provide for the submission of a constitutional amendment making the terms of the county officers four years, came in from Senator Pierce. The constitution limits the terms of county treasurers, clerks, sheriffs, coroners and surveyors to two years. The assessors—not a constitutional office—also hold biennial terms, and Senator Pierce will introduce a bill to extend them to four years.
