#### GENERAL NEWS.

The statement that Mr. Bowen has been authorized by President Castro to offer the Venezuelan customs as a guarantee for the fulfillment of his country's obligations, is confirmed. The offer has not yet been accepted, but it is thought that it may afford the opportunity for a withdrawal of the blockade.

Advices from Guaymas, Mexico, state that orders have been received at Mazatlan by the federal authorities to burn the shipyard which was erected a few years ago at a great cost to the federal government. The destruction of the shipyard is only part of a program of desperate measures to be taken to get rid of the dread bilious plague.

Thoroughbred that originally cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000, were sacrificed at public auction Monday at the Occidental Horse Exchange. They were from the Nevada breeding farm of Paul G. Lane, son of the well known mining man, who decided to retire and shipped all of his blooded stock to San Francisco. They brought a total of only \$1200, less than one of the horses cost him.

As a result of blood poisoning, by being bitten by a prisoner about 18 months ago, Patrolman John T. Collins, a Brooklyn policeman, is dead. Collins was bitten on the hand by a desperate thief in an attempt to escape. The policeman took two days off and then returned to work, but the poison in his system showed itself at intervals in painful rashes and was the cause of frequent fainting spells. Collins, however, remained on duty until Friday last, when he was taken to the hospital, where he died.

#### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

A movement is being agitated in Albany to have the Southern Pacific company move the depot to the city side of the railroad yards. The depot is now located across the tracks from the city.

The senate committee on public lands today ordered a favorable report on Senator Mitchell's bill for the relief of settlers within the limits of the grant to The Dalles military road, in Sherman county, Oregon.

Hale, of Josephine, made an unsuccessful attempt in the House Tuesday morning to add a rider to the Lewis and Clary appropriation bill, which, had it carried, would have put a serious damper on the appropriation.

Nine men are dead and eight or 10 are injured as a result of a rear-end collision on the Great Northern, Tuesday morning at a point known as Happy Hollow, just above Chwaukum, Wash. A bridge gang train smashed into an engine standing with a rotary snow plow.

Fishermen report a big run of smelt in the Lower Columbia. It is said that a continuous school reaches from the Columbia bar to Kelso a distance of nearly 75 miles. The only obstacle to catching them in even greater numbers than at present is the breezy, showery weather that prevails.

Senator Perkins has introduced the amendment to the military appropriation bill which is intended to solve the transport problem. It provides for the charter of transports for five years to the highest bidder, and for contracts for the transportation of troops and supplies to and from the Philippines for the same period.

Work will be begun in the spring upon a new irrigation ditch extending from the Tucanon River to irrigate the Tucanon valley, in Garfield and Columbia counties, Washington. The enterprise has recently been incorporated with a capital stock of \$500,000, the head office being located in Spokane.

## HIGH SCHOOL NEWS

### PUPILS WILL GIVE A PROGRAM FRIDAY.

To Entertain Visitors With Debate and Recitations—Also to Give a Play and Conduct a "Moot" Court.

The city high school debates Friday noon, in the high school assembly room, which is being used since its vacation for class purposes. Considerable interest is being taken by outsiders, and more ought to be taken.

The sides selected to conduct the debate are made up as follows: Affirmative, Syble McDanel and Jessie Tryon; negative, Clarence Allen and Tyra Hutchins. The judges will be selected from the visitors present. The remainder of the program for the afternoon is as follows: Recitation, Frank Pierce; five-minute speech, Earl Simmons; papers, Edith Johnson and Ira Younger; recitation, Ora Holdman.

There is a little uncertainty as to just who will take part in Friday's program, but for the most part the personnel of the program will be as indicated.

#### "Above the Clouds."

"Above the Clouds" will be rendered by the high school on or about February 6—the exact date is not yet determined. It will be put on at the opera house, and the proceeds will be turned in to the high school library fund.
