#### GENERAL NEWS.

California's orange outlook is unusually promising.

The first state railroad of Bolivia is nearing completion.

Armed men are now guarding the state capitol of Colorado.

President Elliot reaffirmed Wednesday that a scab is a hero.

Owing to the scarcity of coal the iron market is very quiet.

Peace has finally been reached between the big ball leagues.

Chicago is planning to build a boulevard under the Chicago River.

The heaviest snow of the winter is now falling in Western Colorado.

Mascagni refuses to be discharged as director of the Rossini Lyceum.

Cocoon oil is the latest product to be brought into competition with hog lard.

England does not approve of the action of the German commodore in Venezuela.

#### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Henry Koellmeier, of Oregon City, was held up Thursday, near that city by a footpad, and robbed of \$10.

Ex-State Senator J. W. Morrow, of Heppner, has been appointed state land agent by Governor Chamberlain.

Fire in the Griggsby-Allen Furniture Company's store at Boise City, caused a loss of \$2000, Thursday evening.

Indian war veterans of Oregon are asking for an appropriation of \$300,000 for back pay, due them from the wars of 1856.

Students of the State University at Eugene are locating Southern Oregon timber land, as fast as they can find suitable claims.

Frank Marsh, of Sumpter, was crushed to death Thursday in a cave-in at the Oregon Monarch mine in the Red Boy district.

The Tacoma Railway & Power Company has begun on a plan to construct an electric railway from Portland to Tacoma, by way of Olympia.

Baker county stockmen will hold a ratification meeting over the news that the National Livestock convention of 1904 will be held in Portland.

Half a dozen residences have been robbed in Tacoma during the past week. The police force is trying to rid the city of every suspicious character.

Heavy rains during the past week have swollen the Southern Oregon streams until much damage has been done, especially on tributaries of Rogue River.

## FIRST FLOUR MILL

SOME FIGURES FROM PENDLETON'S PIONEER MILLER

Umatilla County Flour Goes Directly to Asia—San Diego Bakers Use No Other Make—Wheat for First Mill Here Hauled From Walla Walla.

The report that Byers' mills in this place are "running day and night and turning out 600 barrels of flour per day," led an East Oregonian reporter to visit the establishment and make some inquiries directly of the proprietor. Mr. Byers stated that the mill has as a matter of fact been running day and night for years—most of the time, and turning out its full capacity of 800 barrels per day. Of the output, 3000 barrels per month are sold in Portland and 1000 barrels in Seattle. Of this 4000 barrels of flour at least one-half is for the Asiatic trade.

San Francisco makes a steady demand upon the output of this mill, though it is not heavy. In San Diego there are two bakers who use flour from this mill exclusively. Mr. Byers sold his first flour for the Oriental trade in 1884, or in 1885, directly to a Chinese merchant in San Francisco. Since then the mill has continually sent a portion of its output across the Pacific. Twenty-six men are employed in the mill at this time, and the number is increased to 35 immediately after harvest each year since the new mill was built and the capacity made what it now is. Mr. Byers built the first mill in Pendleton in 1874. It was a 50-barrel affair, and the wheat ground in it was hauled from Walla Walla. There was very little wheat raised in Umatilla county at that time. The Byers mills now turn out, as mentioned above, 800 barrels per day and the elevator and warehouses have a storage capacity of 500,000 bushels. Of this amount the elevator will hold 75,000 bushels.

Mr. Byers' opinion and experience with the varieties of wheat are worth mentioning here. He states that Turkey Red makes the strongest flour, but that the whitest product is from Bluestem. He is interested in the introduction of the Turkey Red wheat and last year brought in 10,000 bushels from the Horse Heaven country. It was introduced into the Horse Heaven country originally from Kansas, where it is the most popular variety. Several thousand bushels of this wheat he sold among the farmers of the country, by whom it was sown last fall as an experiment. It was taken into all parts of the county, so the trial will be impartial.

One reason for the enormous storage capacity of the Byers mills is to enable the management to store great quantities, sufficient to enable the coast dealers with whom he deals to save storage charges at coast points, which are enormous. The present buildings, which were built following the fire of four years ago, were entirely planned by Mr. Byers, no architect being called. The roofs of all the storage houses, including the largest one, which is 100x200 feet in size, are bridge and truss supported to save the room that pillars and partitions would otherwise occupy. The entire plant is lighted by electricity generated by a plant which is part of the equipment. The first electric light plant in Pendleton was put in by Mr. Byers, in his mills. The new buildings are also protected against fire by a complete outfit of hose and hydrants on every floor.

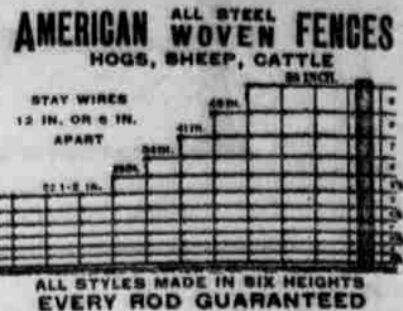
