### ROAD FACILITIES.

Central Oregon That Great Distance From

Heppner does a business that extends to the miles and the same there that are to be seen and Morrow county wool and cattle, with horses, constitute the main, with no incoherence of grain raised in the country, says C. E. Redfield, Daily Journal.

Under the same conditions the immense region of Central Oregon, and extending to the Columbia river on the Nevada line on the west, is a country not touched by the O. R. & N. It is fringed by the same to the east by the same W. & C. R., a feeder of the Pacific. The Columbia flows southward from Biggs to hundred miles. The valley road extends to Whitaker City, also less than the Cascade mountains upon the west.

These short spur lines, no railroad facilities and of products is carried on from the point of production to the point of production. Wool is hauled 150 miles to the railroad. Cattle and horses are the same distance. Goods for the Central Oregon are taken by the wool teams over the mountains and through valleys.

Central Oregon is a prosperous region without transportation

facilities. People have plenty of money and conduct flourishing businesses. But, the country would forge ahead were rail lines provided, as they doubtless will be before long."

### TO CUT OUT PENDLETON.

Bell Telephone Will Build a Line Through Idaho That Will Affect This City.

The Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone Company is preparing to spend nearly a million dollars in Idaho this summer in extending its lines and improving existing ones. Hugh L. Thomas, of Salt Lake, manager of the company arrived in this city this morning to lay out the work and make arrangements for beginning as soon as the weather will permit, says the Boise News.

When seen at the Overland he said: "We shall spend between \$700,000 and \$800,000 in Idaho this summer in extending our lines and improving the present service.

"Among the extensions we shall make will be to construct a line from Shoshone to Malad, a distance of 200 miles. Another improvement will be to give the people of Boise direct service to the Coeur d'Alene country by extending our line from Council Bluffs to Wallace. At present it is necessary to telephone via Pendleton and Spokane. It is an improvement your people will no doubt greatly appreciate.

### Will Visit Eastern Oregon.

The Willamette University Glee Club expects to make a tour of Eastern Oregon during the April vacation. Their glee club has 16 members, all trained singers, and they have been most favorably noticed wherever heard. The itinerary of the club will include the majority of the places along the line of the O. R. & N. road in Eastern Oregon.—Salem Journal.
