## COOK'S BREWERY

WILL BE FINISHED AT ONCE.

Will Have a Capacity of 16 Days—Ross Company Will Erect a Plant With Equal Out-

ment was made in the morning of the return of the coach from the East, where we were to purchase new machinery for the brewery and the ice plant under construction. When the plant will be one of the most modern and up-to-date on the coast and will be a credit to the city of Pendleton. The brewery will have a capacity adequate to supply the town and vicinity of the best brew masters that has been secured to Anderson, which gives every one that the product will suit the needs of good beer. The work of constructing the new plant is delayed by inability to select, but this trouble has been overcome and work will again commence that the building will be completed and machinery placed so the plant will be ready for the market by the summer.

The plant is to be modern in design and will have a capacity of 16 days. Very little will be used for domestic purposes. Half of this will supply the needs of the people locally. The new plant of the Ross company, which is built on the site of the old plant opposite the O. R. & N. house, is to have a similar design to that of the people of Pendleton. The people of Pendleton have plenty of the cold stuff of the unpleasant heat of the winter. The wise ones are nodding knowingly in anticipation of the prices and are watching the market with a good deal of interest. Robbins will lead the affirmative and W. C. Burgess the negative. The membership of the club is steadily increasing, and now numbers over 50. A general and standing invitation is issued to all people to attend every session of the club, which meets regularly every Sunday at 2 p. m. There are no secret meetings whatever, and no admission charged.
