PAYMENT OF TAXES

RELATING TO THIS SUBJECT TO BE CHANGED.

Law is Published for the benefit of Inquirers—Taxes Become Delinquent First Monday in March—Three Per Cent Rebate for Payment.

Inquiries are being received in the office in regard to the present law relating to the payment of taxes. The benefit of these and others, which that section of the code relating to this subject, is published. Walter M. Perce has introduced a bill in the legislature, changing the time for the payment of taxes from March 1, to the fall of the year, immediately after harvest, when among all classes of tax-payers more plentiful.

Another bill has been introduced, which proposed to remove the three per cent rebate on taxes paid before the 15th. The argument of the advocates of this bill is that taxes are levied on the county in full, and that this is a total loss to the government, which must be made up in other ways, and does not benefit a majority of taxpayers who are compelled to pay penalty on account
