IN STATUARY HALL.

Maryland Presents Statue of Charles Carroll and John Hanson—Work of Richard Brooks.

Washington, Jan. 31.—Statuary Hall of the national capitol was the scene of interesting exercises today incident to the acceptance from the state of Maryland of the statues of Charles Carroll and John Hanson. Congress adjourned for the occasion and the members, together with many other interested auditors, listened to addresses by Congressman Dalzell of Pennsylvania, Congressman George A. Peck of Maryland, and several other speakers, who eulogized the lives and public services of the two distinguished Marylanders, whose memory is to be perpetuated in bronze in the national "Hall of Fame."

The two statues form a notable addition to the many magnificent works in Statuary hall. The statues are the work of Richard E. Brooks, the distinguished Massachusetts sculptor.

Charles Carroll is represented as replying to the remark that there was more than one Charles Carroll, in the familiar words "but there is only one Charles Carroll of Carrollton." He stands solidly on his right foot, his left foot being advanced and he holds in his right hand a pen. In his left is the copy of the Declaration of Independence which he is about to sign. His face bears a resolute expression, such, no doubt, as he wore when he signed his name "Charles Carroll of Carrollton."

John Hanson, president of the Continental congress, is represented as standing firm on his left foot, with his right advanced. His head is slightly bent forward and he is in an attitude of reflection. In his left hand is held a document, which is evidently the cause of deep study. The right hand grasps one of those long sticks so common in colonial and revolutionary days. The head is covered and the shading from the peak of the hat of the period accentuates the thoughtful pose.

Future Admirals to Graduate. Washington, Jan. 31.—President Roosevelt, Secretary of the Navy Moody and other public men, including prominent officers of the navy and members of congress, will go to Annapolis Monday to attend the graduation exercises at the United States naval academy. The first class, composed of 52 midshipmen, will receive their diplomas from Secretary Moody. It is not customary to hold the graduation exercises at the academy until later in the spring, but ever since the Spanish war and the enlargement of the navy, it has been found necessary to advance the date each year in order to relieve the death of commissioned officers in the navy.
