COMMERCE - TRADE

MILLERS RAISE FLOUR TO \$4.00 PER BARREL.

No Settled Price of Flour to Customers—Ranges From \$4.35 to \$4.50 per Barrel—Little Change in General Market.

The provision markets today afford very little that is novel, but there is an abundance of staples—nice goods, and at no exorbitant prices.

The meat markets offer today, outside of the staple, everyday products, fresh halibut, smelt, salmon, herring and perch, abundant supplies of which arrived today from the Sound. These fish are selling at from 10 to 12 1/2 cents per pound. Swartz & Gredlich yesterday purchased 100 lambs for the mutton market, that are said to be very fine. They were purchased of P. C. Sperry.

Perhaps the most appetizing things in the market now are the recent consignment from California of green peas at 15 cents per pound, two pounds for 25c; cauliflower, 10 to 20 cents per bunch; celery, 5 to 10 cents per bunch; onions, 5 cents per bunch, three bunches for 10 cents; lettuce, 5 cents per bunch.

The price of flour was raised February 1 by the millers to the retailers, 50 cents per barrel—from \$3.50 to \$4. There is no settled retail price for flour, but on the contrary, it is sold today to the consumers all the way from \$4.35 or \$4.40 to \$4.50.

The poultry, livestock and produce market—prices to farmers—are just what they were a week ago. The retail market in general for grocery products—prices to the consumer—are also at a standstill.

All the prices quoted below are those paid the farmers or producers by the retailers of the city except the list headed "Pendleton Retail Grocery Prices."

The following are the prevailing average prices for hides in this market: Beef, green, 4@6 1/2c per lb.; beef dry, 10@13c; mink, 50@75c each, with a possibility of \$1.25 each if the size is good and the condition prime; coyote, 50c and possibly \$1; bear skins, according to quality and size, from \$5 to \$15; coon, 25@30c; horse, perfect, with head, tail and mane, \$1 to \$1.25; sheep, 8@9c per lb. dry.

The Wheat Trade.

Portland, Feb. 5.—There is no new development in the wheat market here. Prices are without change. Offerings during the past week have been liberal, and buyers purchased a number of good round lots. At no time has there been any delay this season in loading ships. It shows without doubt that exporters all had plenty of wheat on hand. The past month 4,000,000 bushels of wheat and flour, have been exported from the North Pacific coast, and the month of February will be quite active, as all the vessels now on berth here and at Tacoma to the number of 15 will be finished. Seven months of the cereal year have passed, and shipments now total 20,750,000 bushels of wheat, flour being included in these totals. The activity in shipping will be over at the close of the present month. Something will be done in the next three months, but the wheat shipping business will be practically completed by the end of February. Millers are in the market for wheat, and are heavy buyers than exporters, and are paying a slight margin in values over export quotations. We quote club wheat, 75; bluestem, 86c; valley, 78c per bushel.

San Francisco, Feb. 5.—Prices are well maintained in this market for wheat and although buyers are disposed to hold off and purchase only what is required for immediate needs, the selling interests realize the strength of its position and stands firmly for its asking rates. They are well assured that supplies of wheat in the state are small, and this fact, coupled with the demand from Australia, furnishes a good strong basis for their demand of prices. The exporting interests are not heavy buyers at present, but what they do buy they have to pay the full quotations for without obtaining any concession. No. 1 shipping is quoted \$1.43 1/2 to \$1.46 1/2; milling, \$1.47 1/2 to \$1.52 1/2 per cental.

Wool Market.

Boston, Feb. 5.—The wool market has been somewhat irregular of late. Fine staple territory wools have been active, and the market generally is firm, with prices well held. Still higher prices are looked for. 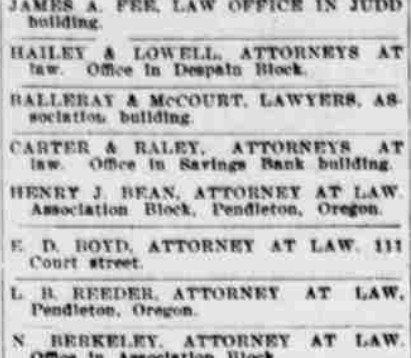
