A BRIEF BLOCKADE.

Meets a Squall on Blue Mountain Between This City and Walla Walla.

Friday evening No. 7, the Spokane passenger train due here at 5:45 in the snow on Blue mountain was compelled to back up and Pendleton by way of Umatilla.

At a point near Downing station were found to be full of snow. The engine not being equipped with plow was unable to force her way through. The regular tonnage train is about all the little engine pull over the mountain, and it is but little extra obstruction.

The mixed train, arrived here at 6:30 as usual and at the time the summit very little snow was upon the track.

The spring weather of the past two weeks had led the management to believe that the small temporary plows for the engine pilots would not be needed this winter on the branch.

Walla Association Arranges to Hold Show on Larger Scope.

Walla, Feb. 9.—The Walla Poultry Association has arranged to hold its fifth annual show the first week in February, 1904, and at that time will make an innovation in Northwestern shows. An Eastern judge will be brought here to judge the show on strictly up-to-date lines, and an effort will be made to classify the birds of Washington and Oregon in a manner yet unattempted. Chas. DeWitt of New London, Ohio, will be brought to this city, and it is expected that he will judge but the Walla show while on the trip. Mr. McClave is president of the American Poultry Association, and is perhaps the most celebrated judge of poultry in the country.

THE TAX SALE.

Large Amount of Land Bid in by the County.

The tax sale, the first under the present law governing the subject, was held this forenoon, as advertised. A large quantity of the land advertised, that which was not wanted by private individuals either for holding or speculation, was bid in by the county at 10 per cent interest from the present owners in case of redemption.

The majority of the land was bid in at 20 per cent straight, the maximum legal rate for redemption on the amount of the tax with the penalties and the costs added. The competition for a good many pieces of the lands advertised was genuine and spirited, and took the form of bidding acceptance (if redeemed) of a lower rate of interest than that which the law allows. These bids would start at the legal rate—20 per cent, and gradually scale down until par bids were reached or the right of redemption without any interest being charged. Below that point the bids presently ran, until some bidders were actually offering 2 1/2 per cent premium. Naturally the question of the legality of such a bid was at once raised.

In the absence of County Attorney Halley, Judge Hartman was referred to. His decision was that premium bids were invalid, that no bid would hold water that was for less than par or that offered a premium. Of course the low interest bids and the premium bids were made by representatives of the original owners of the lands, or by those who would themselves get hold of the lands ultimately if they can, for the investment.

Will Duplicate Her Ticket.

It has been concluded, in view of her improved condition of mind, not to take steps to legally inquire into the sanity of Mrs. Ida Poole. The railroad company will duplicate her transportation from Pendleton to Lincoln, Neb., and as soon as it arrives she will be started on her eastward journey. The county authorities are satisfied that they have ascertained the whereabouts of the woman's brother, mother and some other relatives. It is said she has a brother living in South Omaha. These people have been communicated with but vouchsafe no reply.

Assaulted His Wife.
