Major Clark has devoted himself to a study of the exploration of Lewis and Clark and the incidents which le' up to their overland trip to the Pacific coast, and has given to historians of recent days much information which had been carefully guarded in

the family annals. "I regard it as lamentable," said Major Clark, "that comparatively little was recorded of the Lewis and Clark expedition. Two years ago Mrs. Eva Emery Dye, the Oregon his-torian, called upon me at Detroit, in her search for information regarding the expedition, and she related to me some humorous experiences. At Boston she was unable to find auything beyond the government reports. She was taken to the Washington elm. Longfellow's house, the galeries of art, and graveyards of revolutionary heroes, the old tombs of the Franklins and John Hancock and Others. lins and John Hancock, and Otis and Adams, and Paul Revere, and even to the lowly mound of Mother Cloose. Shrimps, Crabs, Lobsters and but nobody knew anything about Lew-is and Clark.

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
