GENERAL NEWS.

The Mercantile Trust Company and J. Edward Addicks were Tuesday enjoined from selling \$5,000,000 of securities of the Bay State Gas Company, of Boston.

The coast and geodetic survey says the earthquake felt in the South Seas on January 13, was also felt at the observatories at Baldwin, Kan., and Chittenden, Md.

O. F. Bowers, of Oklahoma City, formerly immigrant agent of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railway, has been indicted for issuing fraudulent checks to the amount of \$5000.

An application was made at Trenton, N. J., Wednesday for a receiver for the Indian Territory Illuminating Oil Company, on the ground that 100,000 shares of stock were fraudulently issued.

The Louisiana Purchase Exposition board of directors yesterday voted to organize an international congress of art and science in connection with the exposition and set aside \$200,000 for the purpose.

The corporation of Dover, England, after a heated debate Tuesday, accepted Andrew Carnegie's offer of \$50,000 to found a public library in Dover. The mayor cast the deciding vote in favor of acceptance.

When the transport *Prairie* sails from the Brooklyn navy yard today, she will carry \$3,000,000 of Uncle Sam's currency, which is to pay the officers and crews of the ships of the North Atlantic squadron now on the West Indian station.

A boiler explosion in Charles Helminger's foundry at Adel, Wis., Tuesday, killed Raymond Whiting, aged 8, fatally injured Mrs. William Burke and David Haff, and injured four other persons. The foundry and a hotel were damaged to the amount of \$25,000.

A hobbled loaded with young people ran into a Colorado & Southern switch engine at Leadville, Colo., Tuesday night, seriously injuring six people. William Tappin had his hip broken and Charles Holden and Alfred Cully had their backs broken and are not expected to live. The other members of the party are severely bruised.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

A bill appropriating \$5,000 for a summer normal school at Newport, has passed the house.

F. Hawley, of Sumpter, has been sued for \$10,000 damages for breach of promise, by Mollie Tugale.

Artesian water has been struck on the Washington side of the Columbia opposite Castle Rock, Or.

Platinum has been discovered in large quantities in the Galles mining district of Josephine county.

Another rich strike was made on the 300-foot level in the Golconda mine, Wednesday. Assays run \$260 per ton.

It is a penitentiary offense to steal a bicycle. This bill has passed both houses and awaits the governor's signature.

Arizona and Nevada have expressed a willingness to subscribe to the Lewis and Clark fair fund, with a small appropriation.

Fred Fletcher, a Lakeview stage driver was lost in a severe snow storm and almost frozen to death before he reached a settlement.

The condensed milk factory at Forest Grove is now in operation. It will distribute \$30,000 per month among the farmers of that vicinity.

John Usher, a pioneer of Linn county, died at Albany Wednesday. He has resided in that county for 30 years. Usher was a native of Sweden.

The term of Samuel Howard as state barber examiner, expires March 1. J. C. Wise, H. A. Wolf and William Wanner, of Portland, are candidates for the position.

COUNCIL MEETING

CITY MAY BUY A TON-STEAM ROLLER.

Representative of Manufacturing Co., Gives Detailed Description of Machine, Which Costs \$3750—Main Street to be Graded—Sisters of St. Francis Protest Against Improving Byers' Lane.

There were present at the council meeting last night Recorder Pitz Gerald, City Attorney Carter, Street Commissioner Fee, Fire Chief Withee, and Councilmen Sommerville, Clifton, Johnson, Switzer and Dickson.

G. W. Evans, representing the Buffalo Pitts Manufacturing Company, outlined the terms upon which his company would furnish a 10-ton steam roller. The cost of such a machine would be \$3,750 cash laid down here. There was practically no difference in the price of the machine if bought on time, except that the company naturally want interest on their money. Another proposition was to lease the machine virtually on a trial for two years, but it would not cost any less if bought under either a time agreement or under a lease.

Such a machine as it seems likely the city will need, while it is called a 10-ton machine, really weighs when empty 24,000, and when the coal tank and water tank are both loaded, ready for operations, it weighs 27,000 pounds. The price given, \$3,750, includes pump, hose, tank and all fixtures. A wheel attachment, by which a rock crusher can be operated with its power will cost \$100 extra. The bin, which is a part of the outfit, will hold 800 pounds of anthracite or 500 pounds of bituminous coal. Mr. Evans also stated that the engine would consume all the way from 500 to 1,000 pounds of coal per day of 10 hours, its working capacity he stated to be one ordinary block per day; that is, it will start with the untouched surface of spread rock and leave it ready for travel, one ordinary block per day.

He credits it with a capacity for rolling down ready for travel 100 tons of rock every 16 hours. Also that it has a traction power equal to 20 horses. The point being raised of whether it could climb the hills on either side of the city, Mr. Evans asserted, and exhibited photographs supposed to substantiate the claims, that it could, with its own motive power, climb a grade of 28 feet to the 100 feet.

Evans concluded by stating that his company would at any time pay the transportation of a committee to be appointed by the council, from Pendleton to Portland to see the machine in actual operation. The council took no action. It would probably have taken action had not the mayor and two of the council been absent. As it was, the subject was turned over.

Liquor Licenses.

The applications of Morgan & Bogart, Russell & Co., and Gus Stangler for licenses to sell liquor, were favorably passed upon, and an order made in each case for the license to be issued. Each application was accompanied by a bond, which was approved.

Grading of Main Street.

An ordinance was unanimously passed for the grading of Main street between Jackson and Wilson (two blocks) and for sidewalk Main on both sides from Jackson to Washington street (one block). The cost of the improvement to be assessed against the abutting property. The petition for the same was filed last September.

Catholic Beg Free Water.

An address from the Sisters of St. Francis was introduced and read. The address is to the following effect: Trusting that in a few years we will be better able to control the debt contracted by us, incurred mainly for the improvement of the city and the benefit of its citizens, we petition the city council to assist us till then by allowing us free use of the city water for the hospital. The address also sets forth that owing to the present condition of the finances of the order they

find it impossible to meet the expense of improving the eastern end of Court street, (or the order's share of the expense of the improvement) according to the present plans. The address simply states that the order is unable to bear its share of the expense, but makes no suggestion as to how it may be relieved from the burden. The natural inference is that the order would prefer that the work be not done at all for the present. The address concludes with the statement that the order is now making arrangements to build 700 feet of sidewalk on Court street, and "feels obliged to protest against other improvements at the present time." The address was referred, without discussion, to the street committee.

Marshal's Report.

The report of the city marshal for the month of January was read and approved. It states that there were 53 arrests during the month for all kinds of offenses. The total salary list amounted to \$197.50. Wood for the jail cost \$3, bread for the jail was purchased at an expense of \$2, and the cab hire "for the jail" amounted to \$8.50.

Treasurer's Statement.

The city treasurer's statement for the month of January made the following exhibit: It too, was read and approved. Receipts—Balance on hand December 31, 1902, \$10,978.73; licenses, \$1,585.70; taxes of 1901, \$27.50; streets, \$29.85; interest on levee sinking fund, John R. Brown note, \$68; fines, \$377.75; cemetery, \$45; total, \$13,105.73.

Liabilities—General fund, warrants paid, \$5,552.80; balance January 31, 1903, \$7,550.93. Total, \$13,103.73.

Recorder's Statement.

The city recorder's statement for the month of January was also read and approved. The following synopsis gives its leading features: number of arrests, 52. Amount of fines collected, \$377.75. Number of jail sentences, 5. Receipts from sale of cemetery lots, \$45; sale of dirt, \$29.85; liquor licenses (six) \$1,650; express and track licenses (21) \$165; pawnbrokers' licenses (four) \$12.50; shooting gallery license (one), \$7.50; bicycle licenses (four) \$6.25; shows (nine) \$18; bill poster, (one) \$2.50. Total, \$1,861.95. Number of cases of contagious diseases: measles, 13; scarlet fever, 12; smallpox, 5. Deaths from contagious diseases: scarlet fever, 3.
