There will be in the market for Satorday's purchasing and perhaps sooner, fresh flounders at 12½ cents per pound; fresh herring at 10 cents per nound; Sound smelt at 10 cents per pound; fresh perch at 12% conts per pound; fresh salmon at 12% cents per pound; fresh halibut at from 10 to 1234 cents per pound. The dealers guarantee all these varieties of fish as in prime condition. It is possible that they can be purchased this evening, but their arrival is not guaranteed until in time for Saturday's marketing.

The best granulated white sugar is 30 cents per sack cheaper than it was a week ago-is now \$6 par sack. Coarse salt, stock salt, is quoted 25 cents cheaper than a week ago, by the sack.

There is now in the market an unusually excellent line of green stuffs; celery at 10 cents per bunch, cauliflower at 15 cents per head, green onions at 5 cents per bunch, turnip greens at 5 cents per pound, cabhage at 4 cents per pound and sweet pota-toes at 5 cents per pound. All these articles are imported fresh from Calformine except the turnip greens and the green onions, which are raised here by Chinamen.




