### IN POLICE COURT.

Eight Pendleton Boys Assaulted Three Country Boys—Guilty of Disorderly Conduct.

Eight boys, Emmett and Mort Summers, Herbert and Claude Franklin, Charles Gibson and Charles Hastings, Lloyd Sheridan and Robert Linsner were found guilty in Judge Fita Gerald's court this afternoon of disorderly conduct. Sentence was suspended upon the promise all the boys made that they would not in the future attempt to bulldoze boys from the country who were left in charge of the wagons in which they rode to town, while their fathers transacted business. The complaining witnesses in this case were the young sons of Charles Heighan and Mr. Dougherty, both residents of McKay Creek. It appears that the Heighan and Dougherty boys were amply able to take care of superior numbers and did so, but when the first aggressors went away and returned with reinforcements the proportion of eight town boys to the three boys from the country proved too great odds.
