WANTED TO GET RICH

People of St Louis Were Done in Approved Style by the Turf Companies.

ARNOLD ESCAPES TO MEXICO WITH \$5,000,000 IN CASH.

Telegram Received at St. Louis From Parsons, Kan., Saying That the President Had Passed Through That Town.

St. Louis, Feb. 16.—The grand jury's investigation into the turf investment companies was resumed today. Neither E. J. Arnold nor his manager, L. A. Gill, have yet been found for service by the sheriff.

From the correspondence and literature of the firm seized as evidence by the grand jury, it develops that Postoffice Inspector George A. Dice recommended a fraud order against the concern after his investigation. Instead of the order, it is stated, Arnold & Co. received a letter from an influential postal official which they used as an advertisement.

The writing of this letter and the reasons for overruling the recommendation of Inspector Dice will be made the subject of a sweeping investigation. Arnold & Co. employed the best legal talent in several cities to look after their business and watch for such developments. Letters are said to have been found from at least one member of the Missouri legislature pertaining to the interests of the company at Jefferson City.

Later—Escaped to Mexico. St. Louis, Feb. 16.—Arnold and Gill the turf investment men were indicted by the grand jury. A score of detectives searched the city, but failed to find either. Later a telegram was received from Parsons, Kan., that they passed through there Saturday night en route to Mexico.

It is reported that Arnold has \$5,000,000 with him in currency of high denominations, which he had been gathering in anticipation of a crash.

SECRETARY OF COMMERCE. Cortelyou Nominated for Position by President—James Garfield, Jr., Will Be Commissioner of Corporations.

Washington, Feb. 16.—President Roosevelt sent to the senate this morning the nomination of George B. Cortelyou to be secretary of the new department of commerce, and labor. It is announced on high authority that James Garfield, son of the martyred president, the new civil service commissioner, is to be appointed commissioner of corporations under the new department.
