### THE INDEPENDENT WEST.

In the East the West is still looked upon as new and crude. The residents of the states along the Atlantic seaboard suppose we still have the primitive pioneer conditions which existed a few decades ago. Time was when the development of the natural resources of the West required a large expenditure of Eastern capital.

We called on the East for money to put in and to move our crops. Year by year the demand has lessened. The Western mortgages have largely been paid off and the farmers have money in the bank. They have money to carry on their farms and money to loan. Nebraska, which 50 years ago was virgin prairie, recently loaned the old commonwealth of Massachusetts \$300,000. It invested its surplus funds in bonds issued by Massachusetts, bearing 3 1/2 per cent interest.

The time is coming when the commercial supremacy will not remain in the East. The almost boundless resources of the West, our unlimited raw material will bring manufacturing plants here. In place of bringing goods across the continent to ship to the Orient we will make the goods here on the coast. We are destined to see a wonderful growth of our shipping interests which will be engaged in taking our products to China and other Eastern countries. The movement of population and capital to the Pacific Slope will double the population of our cities in the next two decades and settle up our waste places.

### RIVER PUMPS WATER.

This is possible, according to investigations made by the United States geological survey, concerning the Kings river of Central California. The valley through which this river runs is one of the richest in the West, the profits from raising-growing alone amounting to over two million dollars in 1900. Nearly 400,000 acres are now under cultivation. This is about all the water from the Kings river is capable of moistening.

However, it is believed that a large additional supply of water can be secured from wells sunk in the lower part of the valley, where the seepage collects. The water from these will be pumped by electricity generated from a plant operated by water-power from the Kings river itself. The plant will be located in the upper valley, and the electricity transmitted to the lower part to operate the pumps. It is estimated that over two hundred thousand more acres of valuable land can be brought under cultivation by this plan.—Maxwell's Tallman.
