> Although the first work that at tracted public attention to Mr. Burdette was a series of articles in a lit tle paper of his own, called the Peoria Evening Review, he became famous through his work as a paragrapher on the Burlington Hawkeye. Mr. Bur cette was glad to speak of those days the other night.

Started a Paper.

"After I had done some newspaper work and gained a little experience, said he, "in a company with Jerry Cochran I went to Peoria, where we started the Evening Review. It was a daisy; one of the prettiest papers you ever saw. How did I make my first hit? Well, you see it was this way: My first wife was an invalid very much, so to amuse her I used to notice all the funny little things and try to remember them to tell her. One day she asked me why I didn't put them in print. Finally I tried one or two, and they proved a great success They were mostly along the line of domestic sketches, like those written by the Danbury News man,

The Peoria Review wasn't a finan-cial success. One fine day we had to

"Artemus Ward was in a small ciass by Limselt. There was neve my one at all like him except Bi Nye. Those two had much the same way of looking at things. Twain also alone. Most of the others have gone, but he only seems to grow me lower and richer as the time passes

About humorists of today? in my opinion there are just as got ones now as there ever were. They may not attract much attention, for times have changed, but they are

here just the same.
"Take 'Mr. Dooley' and George Ade or example. There never were any unnier people than they are. Mr Dooley's' work will live longer, for it s not likely that the next generation vill be able to understand Ade's slang And then the philosophy of "Dooley s so rich.

"You see," Mr. Burdette went on to "times have changed since then in those cays all the funny things vere confined to one part of the naper, and every paper of importance lad its professional tunny man who took charge of the lepartment. Nowadays whatever they may say of the modern paper, it cannot be accused of being dry. There is humor in the headlines, in the editorial paragraphs and in the articles themselves.
