## GENERAL NEWS.

There have been over 100,000 deaths from cholera in the region of Manila. Paul Kreuger, ex-president of the Boer republic, lately censured the crown princess of Saxony for her misdeeds.

Carré Nation is now speaking at Los Angeles, Cal. She declares that that city is the most immoral she ever visited.

Queen Wilhelmina, of the Netherlands, will name the empire to settle the claims between the United States and Venezuela.

George Hutchins, of Carlsbad, N. M., one of the best newspaper correspondents in the South, was shot and killed in a quarrel Monday.

It is reported from Minnesota and other central states that many people are preparing to come to Idaho, Oregon and Washington this season.

An electric road 30 miles long is to be built in the shape of a bow through a number of thriving towns near Cleveland, each end of the bow terminating in that city.

George B. Cortelyou, the secretary of the new department of commerce and labor, first came into prominence in 1895, when Grover Cleveland appointed him his executive clerk.

J. Edward Addicks, the union republican candidate for senator in Delaware, has issued a statement, wherein he declares that hereafter no notice will be taken of those he terms as booters.

An organization has been formed called the Navy League of the United States, the purpose of which is to create public sentiment in favor of a navy that will make the United States the equal of Great Britain in power.

The currency bill for coinage in the Philippines which passed the senate Monday, prescribes that the unit of value shall be a gold peso of 12.5 grains of gold, nine-tenths fine. Seventy-five million silver coins of the denomination of one peso will be provided.

## PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

About 800 coal miners employed by the Western Fuel Company at Nanaimo, B. C., have gone out on a strike.

An effort is being made at Olympia to get the railroad commission bill before the house for a decisive vote.

Contracts have been let for 10 new steel bridges on the Washington division of the O. R. & N., to be built this spring.

Nicholas McDuell, a carpenter, was found dead in bed at Sumpter, Oregon, Monday morning. He died of heart failure.

A moral wave has struck Fairfield, Washington, and Sunday all business houses were closed for the first time in its history.

John W. Gates, the steel magnate of Chicago, has purchased the rich Kendall mines at Butte, Mont. The purchase price was \$10,000,000.

Faulty electric wire insulation started a fire in the Whitehouse Dry Goods Company at Spokane Monday afternoon that resulted in a loss of \$45,000.

Edward Allen, a rancher living near Missoula, Mont., was held up early Monday morning and severely beaten by two men, who robbed him of a few dollars.

Harry Valer, foreman of a piledriver crew, working at Priest River, Idaho, was knocked off a trestle Friday by the pile cable and received injuries, which caused his death.

The house of the Washington legislature has passed a bill making it a felony punishable by from one to three years' in the penitentiary, to conduct a gambling house.

H. A. Allen, of Seattle, fell in a well 65 feet deep Monday and received injuries from which he died two hours afterward. The rope broke with which he was descending.

### Rural Routes Established.

Washington, Feb. 18.—The appointment has been announced of carriers on rural route No. 1, out of Corvallis, Or. The first carrier is Miles T. Starr; substitute, Claude T. Starr. The Corvallis rural route will go into operation on March 2. The route is 25 miles in length and covers an area of 21 square miles. It serves a population of 425 people, contained in 85 houses. Rural route No. 2, from Hood River, Or., will go into operation on February 16. The length of the route is 22 miles, the area covered is 13 square miles. The population served is 1,017, with 226 houses on the route. Lebanon route No. 1, will go into operation on March 2, with one carrier. The route is 24 miles in length, and covers an area of 22 square miles. It serves a population of 520 farmers, contained in 104 houses. It is announced by the department that Gresham rural free delivery routes Nos. 2, 4 and 5 will begin operation on March 2, with three carriers. The total length of the route is 64 miles, covering an area of 47 square miles. These new routes out of Gresham will serve a population of 1,175 people, contained in 261 residences. The postoffices at Rockwood and Powell Valley will be discontinued.

# MAY BE REPEALED

WILL SCALP BOUNTY HAVE TO GO?

Chance That Bill May be Held Up in the Senate.

Salem, Ore., Feb. 18.—Whether the scalp bounty law shall be repealed is yet a doubtful question. The matter came up in the senate yesterday afternoon and an attempt was made to put the bill through the second and third readings, but Senator Steiwer asked that the bill be referred to the committee on irrigation in order that a committee of gentlemen from Eastern Oregon may be heard upon the subject.

Senator Kuykendall objected to delay. He said that the postage railway bill, carrying an appropriation of \$165,000, had been passed with an agreement that the scalp bounty law should be repealed. He did not like to see anything done that might lead to the repealing of the bill being held up in committee.

Senator Croisan voiced the same sentiments in a very vigorous manner. He said that the members of the legislature had voted for the postage service of these same men, not a word. The officers were given credit for all that was done. It was a shame and a disgrace to the state to permit such an injustice, and he hoped this senate would do what it could to rectify the great injustice done. Kuykendall and Smith, of Multnomah, spoke in similar vein, the former declaring that no such expensive book as this had been contemplated two years ago, when the issuance of the work was authorized, but since it had been issued in this form at the state's expense, it should be correct and he favored the resolution. Smith characterized what Gantenbein had done as a damnable outrage. Miller thought it should be made certain that enough copies of the revised work be issued to get the matter correctly before the entire public in its proper light.

The resolution was adopted without a dissenting vote.

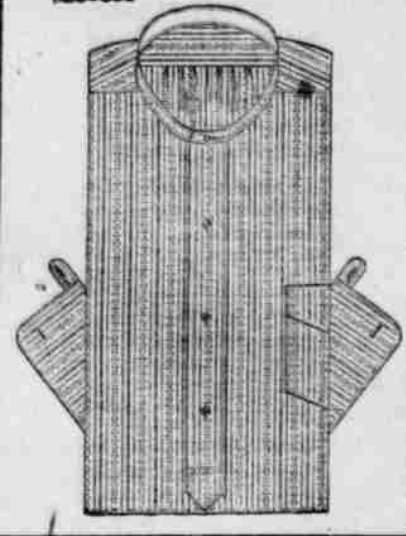
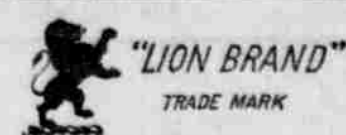
