J. B. Blanchet, the Vancouver architect, has arrived and from now on the business of letting the contracts for the completion of the hospital, and subsequently the work itself will be prosecuted with vigor.

W. J. Furnish has bought from the North American Trust Co. 160 acres of land in section 14, township 4, range 31, paying therefor \$1000. The property lies 11 miles north and four miles west of the city.

T. B. Swearingen and wife have returned from Whatcom, Wash., accompanied by Mr. Swearingen's sister, Mrs. A. C. Senker, of Whatcom, and her daughter, Halcey, who will visit here for a month or six weeks.

Holman Bros., at Holman, have just built a building 30x60 feet to shelter their new feed grinder and chopper, and new engine for running the same. The outfit is complete and in running order. It is one of the largest feed grinding plants in the county.

IN POLICE COURT.

Les Fraker Fined \$25 for Two Assaults on Mr. Bills.

Les Fraker was this morning fined by Judge Fitz Gerald \$25 for two assaults which he made last night upon Mr. Bills. The amount was assessed as two fines, \$10 for the first offense and \$15 for the second.

Blow at Bucket Shops.

New York, Feb. 19.—The future existence and operations of bucket shops in this section is believed to depend in a large measure on the vote to be taken by the Produce Exchange today on a proposed amendment to the by-laws of the organization. The managers of the exchange have framed the amendment with the avowed purpose of dealing a knock-out blow to the bucket shops. The amendment says in part: "Any member of the exchange who shall be interested in, or associated in business with, or who shall act as the representative of, or who shall knowingly execute any order, for the account of any organization, firm or individual engaged in the business of dealing in differences on the fluctuations on the market price of any commodity or corporate stock, without a bona fide contract for the sale and purchase of the same for all actual delivery, shall be deemed guilty of proceedings inconsistent with just and equitable principles of trade, which renders him unworthy to be a member of the exchange, and upon complaint and conviction he shall be expelled."
