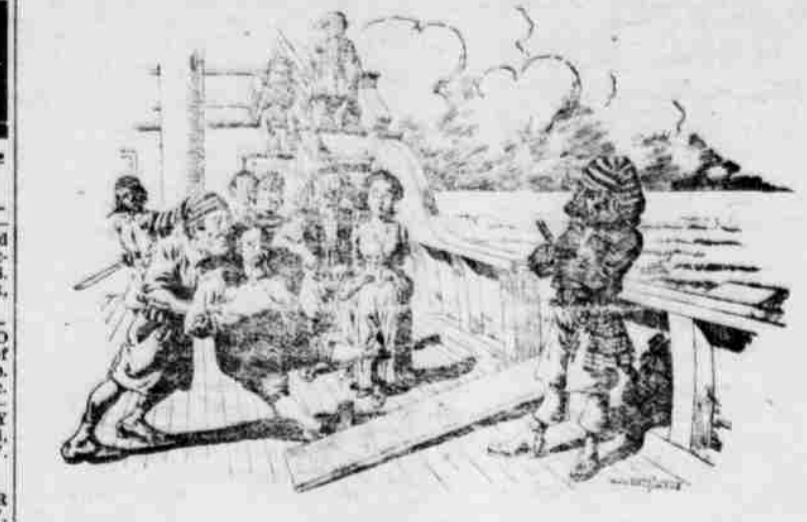

## HAS LION'S SHARE

**WESTERN OREGON HOLDS NEARLY ALL THE OFFICES.**

Three Eastern Oregon Men Find Places in State Government—A Comparison of the Size, Wealth and Population of the Two Sections.

Salem, Ore., Feb. 20.—Eastern Oregon has two-thirds of the area of the state, produces two-thirds of its products, and has about two-fifths of the population.

In view of this a comparison of the offices, state and federal, held by the two sections is interesting.

Western Oregon has state offices as follows:

George E. Chamberlain, governor; F. I. Dunbar, secretary of state; J. H. Ackerman, superintendent of public instruction; A. M. Crawford, attorney general; J. R. Whitney, state printer; J. W. Bailey, food commissioner; L. P. W. Quimby, game and forestry warden; H. G. Van Dusen, master fish warden; William McLean, state veterinarian; A. R. Sweetzer, state biologist; E. R. Pernot, state bacteriologist; Thomas P. Clarke, superintendent of deaf mutes; George W. Jones, superintendent blind school; W. J. Shipley, commandant soldiers' home; J. F. Calbreath, superintendent insane asylum; J. B. Putnam, state librarian; M. L. Chamberlain, clerk of land board.

**Of the Supreme Court it Has:**  
Frank A. Moore, chief justice; Chas. E. Wolverton, associate justice; R. S. Bean, associate justice; J. J. Murphy, clerk; R. G. Morrow, reporter.

**Of the Boards it Has:**  
All five of the state emigration board; all five of the board of pharmacy; all five of the state dental examiners; all three of the barbers' board of examiners; all six of the state military board.

**In Federal Offices it Has:**  
John H. Mitchell, United States senator; Joseph Simon, United States senator; I. L. Patterson, collector of customs; W. F. Mathews, U. S. marshal; D. W. Dunne, collector of internal revenue; John Hall, U. S. district attorney; General Summers, appraiser of port; — Edwards, inspector of hulls and boilers; — Fuller, inspector of hulls and boilers.

**Multnomah County Has:**  
The governor, the governor's private secretary, superintendent of public instruction, food commissioner, game and forestry warden, both U. S. senators, U. S. district attorney, U. S. marshal, collector of customs, collector of internal revenue, appraiser, both inspectors of hulls and boilers.

**Eastern Oregon Has, or Will Have:**  
H. E. Bickers, superintendent reform school; C. W. James, superintendent of the penitentiary; W. Morrow, state land agent.

The state treasurer is from Klamath and could be more properly classed as from Southern Oregon than Eastern—and as for congressmen—honors are easy. Since the creation of the state Eastern Oregon has had one senator, Slater, and one governor, Moody. This is in 45 years.

## NOBLE PRIZES.

Awards Made by Three Colleges of Sweden.

Alfred Noble, a Swedish millionaire and philanthropist, provided what is known as the Noble prizes to be given at the end of each year to those who accomplished the most important results during the preceding 12 months in the line of science, literature and international peace. Noble set aside \$8,400,000 as a permanent fund for this purpose. The awards are made by three colleges in Stockholm, Sweden. The prize winners for last year have been announced as follows: Dr. H. A. Lorenz and Dr. P. Zeeman, of Holland, for discoveries made in connection with the use of the spectroscopy; Dr. Emil Fischer, of Berlin, for discovering the effects of uric acid on the human system, and Major Ronald Ross of Liverpool, England, for discovering that the mosquito is an active agent in the spreading of malaria; Prof. Theodore Mommsen, of Germany, for his writings on Roman history and Latin inscriptions.

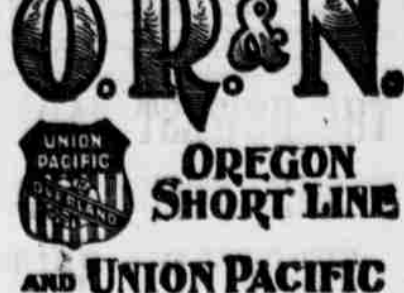
