WERE COMPANIONS

FAITHFUL DOG LEADS WAY TO DEAD MASTER.

Body of William McKay, a Trapper, Found in the South Fork Mountain—Disappeared Last Monday.

Ashland, Or., Feb. 21.—The body of William McKay, a trapper, well known in Trinity county, was found on South Fork Mountain, four miles west of Hyampom, last Monday. The discovery was due to the trapper's faithful dog, McKay and his dog were inseparable companions. On Monday, when the dog appeared at A. S. Fletcher's place, it attracted Fletcher's notice. It seemed to him the dog's actions meant that he wished the man to follow him, and he decided to do so. The delighted animal led the way to his master's cabin, but the dog did not wish to stop there, and Fletcher continued on with him, tramping two miles further through the deep snow, where, sitting by the base of a tree, was McKay, cold and stiff in death. The dog licked the trapper's face and showed almost human intelligence.

Fletcher went to Hyampom to obtain help to remove the body, and later a message was sent to Weaver-ville to the coroner, who summoned a jury. It is believed that McKay became exhausted or sick, and, sitting down by the tree, dropped to sleep and was frozen to death.

BIG BOWLING CONGRESS.

Tenpin Players Gather at Indianapolis for Bowling Contest Monday.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 21.—Tenpin players from all over the country are gathering at Indianapolis to take part in the bowling championship of the United States, which begins in Tomlinson hall Monday, 1 o'clock in the afternoon. From Toledo, St. Paul, St. Louis, Kansas City, Columbus, Des Moines, Erie, Pa., Louisville, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, Chicago, New York and numerous other places the alley men are swarming in, to compete for the many prizes offered and enroll themselves as guests of the Indianapolis bowling association, host for the championship tournament. The hottest kind of competition is looked for in all the events, five-men, two-men, and individual. Close followers of the game predict that no better figures will be scored than have been made in previous competitions. The alleys are new, fresh pins are set up daily, and none of the competitors are to be allowed to practice upon the tournament alleys. All of these conditions will militate against high scoring, and as the visiting bowlers will probably make their visit more or less of a social event it is doubtful if their form will be shown.

Sessions of the American Bowling Congress, controlling organization of the game, will be held, beginning at noon Monday, and when the election of new officers and the selection of a city for the next annual championship come up, hot fights are looked for. The East has announced as its candidate for the presidency John H. Price, of Boston. It is said New York bowlers in a body will boost his cause, while other tenpin knights in that section of the country, who are entitled to vote at the congress, will cast their ballots for him. Price was one of the moving spirits in the Buffalo tournament last year, and he has taken an active interest in the game for years. Mayor Grainger, of Louisville, is looked upon as the most promising candidate of the West. Milwaukee, Louisville and Cincinnati are said to be candidates for the next convention and championship.
