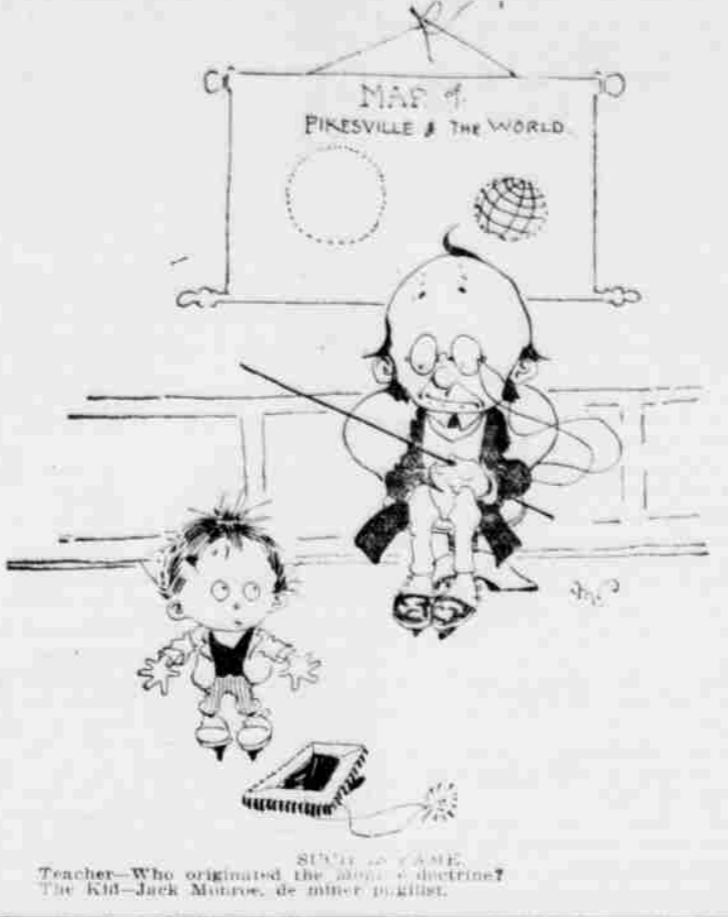

ALASKA WILL EXHIBIT

BUT CONGRESS MUST APPRO-
PRIATE NECESSARY FUNDS.

Citizen of Juneau Says Residents of the Northland Are Not Able to Help Themselves.

"Alaska people would be glad to aid the Lewis and Clark Centennial exposition, and the only way it can be done is for the directors of the fair to draw up a bill asking congress to appropriate \$50,000 as was done for the St. Louis exposition."

This is the expression of Edward C. Russell, Jr., proprietor of the Juneau Daily Dispatch, who is in Portland for a few days, says the Oregonian. "To call Alaska a territory is a misnomer," said Mr. Russell, "for it is as much a district as the District of Columbia. We have no means of making an appropriation except through congress, and the bill should be introduced by the Oregon delegation. The Alaska people would be even more willing to help the Lewis and Clark fair than that at St. Louis, for all the mining men of the West will attend the exposition here, while only a part of them will go to St. Louis. Before the bill is introduced it should be sent to the various commercial organizations of Alaska for endorsement. Nearly every town of any size in Alaska has either a board of trade or a chamber of commerce.

"We believe the election of Senator Fulton will be a good thing for Alaska, especially for the salmon packing interests. He comes from a town where the industry is extensively carried on, and should be conversant with the conditions of salmon canning. The packers of Alaska may have a good deal of trouble this spring on account of the new ruling of the treasury department making it necessary to turn loose ten fry for every salmon packed. The fry must be 'reds,' the salmon next to the chinooks in quality.

"This rule is all very well for the canneries on the 'red' streams, but the majority of the smaller canneries are packing pink salmon, as the valuable reds are found only in certain streams. These men on the other streams cannot get red fry, except at exorbitant prices from the favored hatcherymen, so consequently if the ruling is enforced many of the canneries must go out of business this year. There are comparatively few hatchery streams in Alaska, but in each one many millions of fry can be found. We are trying now to have the collection of the tax put upon packed and salted salmon put under the internal revenue department, so that revenue stamps, like those on cigars, might be placed upon the cases, and the government maintain and operate the hatcheries.

"Portland does more business with Alaska than any other city on the coast, not excepting Seattle. If your men had gained the mail contracts, the business would be doubled. Some day San Francisco will come in with a line of fast steamers and take the whole trade. Business follows the mails every time.

"The Canadian government is willing to concede to the United States practically everything regarding our fisheries, commercial matters and all other things in dispute, provided the government of the United States will give the Canadian government a port of entry in Alaska.

"They are willing to take Dyea, an abandoned town on the Lynn canal, where all the houses stand empty today, mute witnesses of its desertion, as a port of entry—anything, in fact, so long as they can get a port on the Pacific Alaska. When the Yukon & White Pass railroad was built, Skagway became the western terminal, and the port of entry to the Yukon.

and Dyea, just across the canal, was abandoned and deserted.

"The Canadian scheme pushing through United States territory to an outlet on the Pacific Ocean may lead some day to serious results. Fifty-four forty or eight, is not yet dead. It may be a shibboleth of another great political campaign, and no backdown.

"The Lynn canal is a great body of water—a magnificent arm of the Pacific Ocean—almost as large, and for strategic and commercial purposes as important as Long Island Sound. If the Canadian Indians could once get a port of entry there they could take in all their goods and merchandise to the vast Yukon territory without let or hindrance. They could fortify it and bid us defiance at some critical time, when we least expect it. They would then have a port of entry on the Pacific Ocean in the great Northwest, a port that would bring them hundreds and hundreds of miles nearer the Orient than they are today. That is what they want, that is what they are after, and that is about the whole question involved in this boundary dispute."

Municipal Ownership.
 New York, Feb. 24.—Arrangements are completed for the national conference for the discussion of municipal ownership and public franchises, which is to open tomorrow under the auspices of the New York Reform Club. Mayor Low will open the convention with an address of welcome and John G. Agar will preside. The program calls for a number of papers by well known men on transportation, gas and electric lighting, water and telephone, the granting of franchises and the control of public service corporations. The sessions are to last three days.
