List of Assistants Who Will Look After the Assessments in Umatilla County.

The localities given are the postoffice addresses of the deputies, and have no relation to the territory wherein the person named may transact his official duties. In fact, the territory has not been definitely divided among the deputies. Saturday, March 7, the deputies will meet with Mr. Strain at his office to agree upon basis of valuation of property, discuss the law governing the work of assessment, and look after such miscellaneous affairs as may come up pertaining to their official work.

Daily Paper Walls Over Its Disfigured Offspring.

Mr. Cox was first operated upon at St. Anthony's hospital to relieve the impingement of the broken vertebrae upon the spinal cord, since which time his condition has steadily, though almost imperceptibly improved, though he is yet practically helpless.
