WASHINGTON NOTES

MAN WHO SWORE AT FUTURE PRESIDENT IS REWARDED.

Alaskans Who Never Saw a Horse—Fierce Tribes in the North That Were Frightened at the Sight of Pack Animals.

Washington, D. C., March 3.—The fact that the salmon catch of British Columbia for 1902 was just half of that of the previous year has induced the fishery interests of the West Canadian coast to arouse themselves, with a view to insuring larger catches in the future, and already a movement is on foot to secure legislation permitting the establishment of fish traps on the south and west shore of Vancouver island, so that the fish that now escape can be intercepted. The great bulk of the salmon caught in British Columbia are taken from Fraser river. The Canadian fishermen claim that the salmon belonging in the Fraser river are now mostly taken by the Puget Sound fishermen, as the fish are on their way to the spawning grounds, or are returning from these grounds to the ocean. If there is a law enacted permitting the erection of fishtraps, as proposed, many of the salmon now taken in the waters of Puget Sound will be intercepted in British waters, and there will be a material decline in the salmon catch of Puget Sound hereafter. Should the proposed legislation be enacted, the Canadian government will issue foreshore licenses on the southern and western borders of Vancouver island for terms of five years, each lease embracing a half-mile frontage, for which an annual rental of \$100 will be collected.

He Swore at Roosevelt.

Notwithstanding the fact that he once told Theodore Roosevelt to "go to the devil," Colonel Charles G. Humphrey is slated for appointment by the president to the office of quartermaster general of the army, upon the retirement of General Ludington. The president appreciates the fact that the best of men at times lose their tempers. It was when Roosevelt was colonel of the rough riders that he went to Col. Humphrey for certain quartermaster stores. They could not be had at that time, but, upon Roosevelt insisting on being supplied, Humphrey, who was then quartermaster in charge, turned upon the future president and used the language above quoted. This appointment shows that President Roosevelt treasures no resentment from the unpleasant interview of several years ago.

A Ghastly Treasure.

Over in Senator Foster's committee room, perched on the mantle, is a skull of considerable historic interest. It was recently presented to the senator's secretary by Dr. C. B. Cooper, of Honolulu. The skull is of an ancient Hawaiian warrior, and was found in the district of Kullos, in a very old cave. Speaking of the skull, Senator Foster said:

"In ancient times the natives buried their dead in caves, wrapped their bodies in tapa cloth and garments made of bark. The frontal bone of the skull is penetrated, the aperture having probably been made by a spear or arrow. It is believed that the skull is that of one of Kamakameha's warriors. About the beginning of the last century Kamakameha waged a war on several of the native tribes in the vicinity of Honolulu and gave them a good licking. The survivors were driven up a narrow road to a high precipice, and, rather than be captured, they jumped off into the abyss below and were killed to a man. There is not the slightest doubt as to the authenticity of the skull."

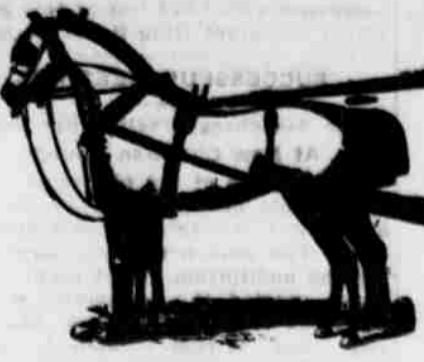
Had Never Seen a Horse.

"It is hard to believe," said Quartermaster John F. Rice, who accompanied Captain Abercrombie on the Alaskan exploration trip in 1859, "that there are persons living in the Western hemisphere who never saw a horse, but such is the case. One night during that trip of four years ago our camp was startled by the report of a rifle. Our native guide discovered across the valley an Indian who had just brought down a caribou. By the aid of sign signals he was induced to come into camp, where we gave him a good supper, and managed to limber up his tongue. He was a Matanuski, a member of the fiercest tribe in Alaska. He had never seen a horse, and our pack animals excited his curiosity and wonder. He declared that no member of his tribe had ever seen a horse, all transportation in his country being carried on by dog teams being hitched to sleds in winter and by pack dogs in summer. All through his stay in camp, this Indian closely observed the horse in wonderment, and was greatly amused whenever the animals would grab a mouthful of forage. He left after a brief visit, to return to his tribe with news of the recently discovered animal."

Manitoba Grain Growers.

Brandon, Man., March 3.—Prominent graingrowers from throughout the province met here today and took the initial steps toward the formation of a central graingrowers' association for Manitoba. The primary object of the organization will be to protect the graingrowers in the shipment and marketing of their crops.
