ART IN PENDLETON.

Pendleton enjoys the reputation of being the best theater town of her proportion, on the Pacific Coast. She furnishes larger audiences and furnishes them oftener to witness good performances, than many of the larger cities.

She patronizes and enjoys a good lecture. She has a larger proportion of people with literary tastes than any other city in the Inland Empire. Her public schools and other excellent educational institutions bear out this statement.

One of the best school journals on the coast is issued by the high school. The entertainments given during the past winter by the schools were of such excellence that it was difficult to believe at times, that they were the work of amateurs.

As a further evidence of this strong aesthetic inclination in Pendleton, the art exhibit now being held at the courthouse, is enjoying the largest and most appreciative audiences that have ever been attracted to any past entertainment in the city. And what is stronger evidence and more pleasing proof of the excellence of Pendleton's tastes is the fact that fully one-half the visitors attending the exhibit are original and able critics of the works of art presented.

They know the artists' lives. They have read and reread the wondrous stories of the paintings and are thoroughly conversant with the merits and faults of each.

In a community far removed from the old educational centers, free from contact with the true and active artistic elements in America, it seems incredible to the Easterner, that the masterpieces of the old Italians are appreciated, discussed from every artistic standpoint, and intelligently criticized in this "rough Western land."

But to Pendleton, and every other Western community, it is a part of life to acquire these accomplishments. Minds and capacities are not limited to one force, in the invigorating atmosphere and deep inspirations that surround the Westerner.

Under the rough garb of Western industrial life, is hidden the scholar and the thinker. It is true of the West that the occupations do not dwarf the man or woman, as in the crowded centers of the East. More general enlightenment, more diversity of tastes and more multiplicity of accomplishments is seen here.

The art exhibit is laying deep foundations in the minds of Pendleton's children. They will carry the memory of these splendid masterpieces through life. They will build up a little mental structure from this firm foundation stone, which will make for the future perhaps even stronger artistic tastes for Pendleton, if possible, than those exercised on this occasion. To the club women of this city who are struggling against all the material elements of a busy community, to set the beauty of art in

the commonplace civic crown, be all honor and praise.
