WILL IT GROW HAY?

MOUNTAIN LAND WILL BE EXPERIMENTED WITH.

W. R. Hawley, of Sumpter, Purchases Large Tract of Timber From Which Logs Have Been Removed and Will Convert it into a Farm.

W. R. Hawley attracted some attention from interested ones last week at the delinquent tax sale in Baker City, by bidding in numerous tracts of land, says the Sumpter Miner. Those who had put many hours going over the list of desirable pieces of property which they wished to secure, did not interfere with Mr. Hawley's bids. It finally became noised around that he was buying lands from which timber had been logged and abandoned as worthless.

He says it will raise hay, which is worth much gold in these parts, and he considers it quite as valuable as either mineral or timber lands.

The general impression hereabouts has been that hay can be grown only on the low, damp lands. Mr. Hawley has been experimenting for several years and has convinced himself that it will also grow, without irrigation, on the uplands; not, of course, at a very high elevation. The lands he bought are along the first bench above the valley between here and McEwen.

At his home in this city on the hillside beyond the school house, alfalfa grows luxuriantly. Last season it was cut four times.

Mr. Hawley has already bought from the owners 2000 acres of this land, and he bid in at the tax sale 2400 acres more, in the same vicinity. Some of this he will secure through tax title. The remainder he has arranged to buy.

Last fall he seeded ten acres, as an experiment, and if it proves to be a success his fortune will be largely augmented. It will also add hundreds of thousands of dollars annually to the wealth of this community, for there is perhaps more money sent out of this country for the purchase of hay than any other commodity. If it can be raised here at home on these logged off timber lands, a new industry will be quickly developed and thousands of heretofore considered worthless lands will be made valuable and profitable.

The problem he is now solving by actual experiment is whether seed should be sown in the fall or spring.

BEHIND WITH FARM WORK.

Winter Has Been too Wet for Putting in Grain.

The few dry days of last week were improved to the utmost by the farmers of Southern Oregon, who are behind hand with their work, having been greatly hindered in their farming operations by the extreme wetness of the winter. Since the rains started, early in November, there has been hardly any time until last week, when it has been possible to get on the land to put in grain. If the weather for the next few weeks is favorable to farming operations, a good crop may be counted upon as certain, but if the seeding is delayed too long, the late rains may not materialize, and the result may be a short crop. The outlook for a bountiful fruit crop was never better at this season of the year.—Rogue River Courier.

THREW ACID IN HIS EYES.

Condon Woman Commits Serious Crime by Mistake.

Some excitement was caused in the lower end of town Saturday morning in which a woman, a young man and a bottle of carbolic acid figured. The woman had the bottle and the young man received the contents in his face burning him seriously but fortunately the stuff did not enter his eyes. The woman, who had a room in the Fix building, claims that certain parties had been disturbing her by trying to gain access to her room and that she "laying" for her tormentors. The young man in question was passing her door when she mistook him for the other fellow and dashed the acid in his face. She expressed much regret for her act when she discovered her mistake—and it was unfortunate.—Condon Globe.

STRUCK BY A WINDLASS.

James Rush Gets His Nose Broken at Granite Hill.

James Rush was the victim of quite a troublesome accident last week while working at the "Redjacket," one of the Granite Hill properties. In raising a load of dirt and rock with a windlass, the handle slipped from his grasp, flew around and struck him squarely on the nose, breaking and crushing that feature. He caught the handle and held it, preventing the bucket from falling on the head of the man in the shaft. He is recovering rapidly and no disfigurement will result.—Rogue River Courier.
