FEDERATION IN CHICAGO. Will Tie Up Windy City's Traffic

Tighter Than Ever Before Unless Their Demands are Granted.

Fourteen unions, whose members are engaged in the handling and transportation of freight have formed a central body in Chicago to be called the Shipping Trades Federation. The new organization is for mutual aid and protection, and will control over 20,000 men, most of whom are preparing to demand shorter hours and increased wages.

The federation includes every union man who handles freight from the time it leaves the factories or wholesale houses until it goes out of the switchyards or is loaded on the lake teamers. Its members are employed by the wholesale houses, railroads or boat lines. The primary object of the federation is to have a central ody that can take up : Il matters of between the unions and companies and adjust them more satistorily than if it were done by out-

side persons.

The federation will have the following unions enrolled as members: Teamsters' National, Longshoremen, Seamen, Railway Express Drivers, Merchandise Packers, Wholesalers' Drug Employes, Commissioner Merchants, Helpers, Freighthandlers, Railway Clerks, Wholesale Grocery Employes, Boxmakers and Sawyers. William W. Murray, of the railway expressmen, has been elected president of the federation, which has received the endorsement of President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor.
