The Rugg Bros. were well enough supplied with sheds that the storm of night before last and yesterday did not interfere with their shearing adjacent to town. They are shearing 2,500 head at this point.

HEATING FOR NEW HOSPITAL.

The G. H. Sutherland Company, of Walla Walla, has contract. Yesterday evening the contract for heating and plumbing the new hospital building was let to the G. H. Sutherland company, of Walla Walla. The building will be completely equipped with what is known to builders as the hot water circulating system, with a 48x12 wrought iron tubular boiler in the basement, and nearly one mile of piping in the entire building.

The highest grade of material will be used throughout the building. The bath tubs, sinks and basins will be enameled and the heating plant will be up-to-date in every particular. The cost of the plumbing is to be \$2,492 and the cost of the heating system \$3,466.

Work on the heating system will begin at once, as well as the work on wiring the building.

G. H. Sutherland, who represents the company which secured the contract, spent yesterday in the city, with Mr. Blanchet, who has charge of the construction of the hospital building.

Another Cold Storage Plant.
Schwarz & Greulich this morning effected the purchase from Colonel Raley of the 100-foot front lying between the W. & C. R. railway passenger depot and Garden streets. These lots about the lots upon which now stands the Empire meat market. The consideration was \$4,000. Schwarz & Greulich will about a year from now, so they informed a reporter, build upon these lots a cold storage plant. There is no intention of manufacturing ice in this plant, but it will be used for the cold storage of meat products.

Contract at Hot Lake.

The G. H. Sutherland company, of Walla Walla, which has the contract for heating and plumbing in the new hospital building, has the contract for plumbing and fitting up the new bath rooms at the Hot Lake Sanitarium. The new bath house is of stone and brick and contains 40 bath tubs, besides plunge bath, elegant shower baths and mud baths. The furnishings are of the highest grade to be found on the market and the cost of the work was \$3,775.

Got Dates Mixed.

The mass meeting called for last night at the courthouse, should have read Saturday night. Owing to a misunderstanding on dates, a mistake was made in the notice of the meeting. However, the subject of the bond issue will be discussed at 8 p. m., Saturday, March 14, at the courthouse, and every one is cordially invited to be present.
