## FROM SUMPTER DISTRICT.

Former Secretary of Red Boy Visiting in the City.

James A. Howard, retiring secretary of the Red Boy Consolidated Gold Mines Company, and secretary of the Golconda Consolidated Gold Mines Company, is in town.

Mr. Howard was asked concerning the conditions in the Sumpter district and said: "In a general way, the Sumpter district is more prosperous than at any other time in its history. There are more new properties being floated and more money coming into the camp than ever before. The mining interests are looking forward to the most prosperous season the coming summer in the history of the camp."

"The great output of the North Pole mine, almost a million dollars during the past year, and the fact that the Columbia mine on the same vein has produced about half a million, has drawn the attention of the mining world to this region, and money for legitimate mining is easier to obtain than at any other period."

Concerning the condition of the Golconda, Mr. Howard says: "Never before in the history of the property has there been as much good ore in sight, and never has development work been marked by such success as it has the past two months."

Mr. Howard says in his opinion, all that is necessary to make the Golconda mine one of the largest producers in the country is careful, economical, and systematic development.

Mr. Howard and his family expect to leave for their new home in Sumpter, Saturday evening.

### Buying Draft Horses.

B. Brown, of Portland, is here trying to buy heavy draft horses weighing from 1500 pounds up. He declares that a search that has extended all over Grant, Morrow and Umatilla counties has resulted in his finding one lone team for shipment. While there are many horses that answer his purpose they are not for sale at all, being all in use. The fact remains that the ranches and farms are about stripped of surplus horses.

### Hunting Timber.

The locating of timber lands in Wallowa county still continues, as nearly every day timber cruisers are passing through Wallowa. As the timber in the East has been exhausted it will be only a matter of a short time until this vast forest will be developed, which, of course, will bring untold wealth to the owners, but with the developing of these lands comes a railroad, so if we lose in one way we will gain in another.—Wallowa News.

### Contract for Plastering.

The contract for plastering the new hospital has been let to T. M. Keller. The specifications call for first-class material and workmanship throughout. The entire building will have an adamant base with a plaster-of-paris finish. The work is to begin as soon as the plumbing is roughed in, and be finished by the first of June. The sand only will be a product of this county, and will come from Umatilla. There will be 7,600 yards of plastering in the building.
