FIREMEN TO DISORGANIZE.

Attempt to Revive Racing Tournaments of "Fire Laddies."
Walla Walla, March 14.—President McDonald, of Dayton, has instructed Secretary T. D. S. Hart to direct the directors of the Eastern Oregon and Washington Firemen's Association, that a meeting of the board be held in Walla Walla March 14. The action of the president in calling the meeting is believed to be for the purpose of winding up the affairs of the association, and not that any attempt will be made to revive racing tournaments, which was the principal object of the association.
Walla would be out of it if attempt to revive racing were made. Secretary Hart said this morning for the reason that she has volunteer department. Walla's volunteer department became inactive of the past some time ago, and the constitution and by-laws of the association, volunteer department only are eligible to participate in tournaments. While this was not his home, he had been here and in this vicinity considerably during the past few years, and had many acquaintances. The funeral and interment will be tomorrow at 2 p. m., at Olney cemetery, conducted by the Odd Fellows.

New Hydraulic Plant.

N. Berkley has just received maps of the placer claims of the Western Improvement Company of Oregon, in which many Pendleton people are interested. In addition to over 2,000 acres of very rich placer ground this company owns several large quartz ledges, assays from which show \$44 to \$53 per ton in gold, silver and copper. The manager, A. C. O'Neal, writes that work is progressing in a satisfactory manner and that their hydraulic plant will be in operation by April 1.
