ODELL DENIES ALL

SAYS HE IS INNOCENT OF SCHOOL LAND FRAUDS.

Collectively, Singly, Generally and Specially Denies the Charges Lodged Against Him—Did Not Sell Information to Settlers, He Says.

The following sweeping denial of all the charges of fraud against W. H. Odell in the state land office is set forth in the Odell pamphlet just issued:

Answer to the joint committee of the Oregon legislative assembly, appointed for the purpose of investigating the affairs of the state land board, and state land agent's office.

Gentlemen: In re. allegations made by one Wm. M. Bushey, relative to the connections and transactions of W. H. Odell, touching the duties and business of the state land agent, in and for the state of Oregon, I hereby for answer deny that the said W. H. Odell did or has, at any time, been guilty of performing any wrongful act, as alleged by said Wm. H. Bushey, and my denial is made general and specific, collectively and singly, as to each and every allegation wherein the said W. H. Odell is charged with any wrong or improper act connected with the land department in and for the state of Oregon, or that the said W. H. Odell was granted any privileges that were denied to any other citizen.

And, for a further answer, deny that said W. H. Odell, while jointly occupying the same office with State Land Agent L. B. Geer, was in the business of selling information as to the whereabouts of "base lands," due to the state, and did sell such information, which information the law pro-

vides shall be furnished free; and Denies that the said W. H. Odell was permitted to exercise any preferred right in the matter of securing approved lists to be forwarded to the land offices of the United States;

Denies that the state land agent, L. B. Geer, ever at any time exposed to the said W. H. Odell applications made by private parties, upon base furnished by themselves, thereby giving the said Odell an opportunity to discover the particular base lands so that he, the said Odell, might put in an application for the same base for clients of his own;

Denies that the said Odell prepared for himself records, during the time he was clerk of state land board, showing as nearly as may be the base lands due the state.

Denies that the said Odell has been wrongfully or unlawfully seeking to adjudicate as mineral in character large tracts of lands to the injury of the state school fund, or the state of Oregon;

Denies that any of the methods pursued in the adjudication of mineral base were not in accordance with law and under the prescribed rules, as adopted by the department of the interior, and promulgated by the honorable commissioner of the general land office.

MOVING TOWNSITE.

Town of Connell, Wash., is Now on Wheels.

W. G. Van Valkenberg, special land commissioner stationed at Connell, arrived in the city last night to spend a day with his family, says the Walla Walla Statesman. He will return this evening.

"Connell citizens are getting ready to move onto the new townsite and the unique sight of a town being actually carted from one place to another is expected to be seen within a month," the commissioner said this morning. "The new townsite is about 1000 feet from the present resting place of the town. Necessarily, when the work begins, there will be a demand for house movers."

"As soon as the town gets settled I look for a veritable building boom to start. Heretofore business men have hesitated about erecting anything more than wooden buildings, owing to the fact that the townsite question was in an unsettled state, but now that that is settled, I look for more substantial business houses to be erected in the future."

"The future of the town is assured, there is no question about that. The surrounding country is being rapidly developed and from statistics that I have been able to gather, I believe there is 150,000 acres in the county sown to wheat this year."

"A small per cent of the farmers have not been able to get their spring wheat sown, but are hard at work, and seeding throughout the county will probably be finished within a week. Fall wheat is looking fine. There has been an abundance of moisture, perhaps more than in Walla Walla county. We have had little snow this winter and practically no cold weather."

Giants to Go South.

Washington, D. C. March 14.—The players of the New York National League ball club, who have been gathering here for several days, have all reported and tonight the entire club will start on the spring training trip. The objective point is Savannah where 10 days will be spent limbering up. At the end of this period the players will begin a trip, during which they will play exhibition games at Birmingham, Memphis, Nashville, Louisville, Indianapolis and Columbus, being due to report in New York about one week prior to the opening of the league season.

Badger Athletes Busy.

Madison, Wis., March 14.—In the University of Wisconsin gymnasium this evening the Badger athletes try conclusions for the second time this season against the team of the University of Chicago. The meet will be somewhat in the nature of a try-out for the Wisconsin athletes for the coming meet at the University of Pennsylvania, to which Wisconsin intends to send a four-mile relay team.
