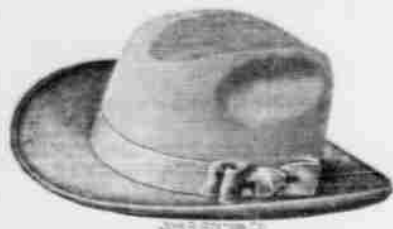

## WANT INFORMATION

COL. DRAKE GIVES INTEREST-  
ING TALK ON OREGON.

Urges Umatilla County to Contribute  
to Permanent Exhibit at Portland—  
Homeseekers Want Information  
That is Reliable.

Colonel Frank V. Drake addressed  
the citizens of Pendleton at the parlors  
of the Commercial Association, Saturday  
evening, on the objects of the  
Oregon bureau of information, as  
given fully in Saturday's issue of the  
East Oregonian.

"The trouble with Oregon has been  
that nobody was authorized to meet  
the homeseekers on his arrival here;  
nobody to take him by the hand and  
lead him to the truth about the state.  
He found no systematized collection  
of statistics on the state's wealth and  
the first thing he did was to write a  
discouraging letter to his friends in  
the East. What we ask of you here,"  
said Colonel Drake, "is to send us ex-  
hibits of your resources. We will ar-  
range them, show them to homeseek-  
ers and direct people to your commu-  
nity, who become interested in it and  
you must have some one authorized  
to meet them here, extend the glad  
hand and place them on the right  
track."

Colonel Drake called attention to  
the fact that a law passed at the re-  
cent session of the legislature, pro-  
vides that the county court of each  
county in Oregon can expend \$1,000  
per year in advertising the county.

He urged the citizens to loose no  
time in responding to the invitation  
of homeseekers for information on  
this county and its industries. Ques-  
tions are asked daily, at the head-  
quarters in Portland, regarding the  
famous wheat belt of Eastern Oregon  
and the place that should be occupied  
by Umatilla county in that exhibit is  
vacant.

Transportation for exhibits is fur-  
nished free by the railroad companies.  
No cost is attached to the matter,  
whatever, except that accompanying  
the collection of the exhibit in the  
county.

The Commercial Association was  
urged by the speaker to send litera-  
ture descriptive of the county's re-  
sources, to be circulated at the head-  
quarters. A good map of the county,  
showing correctly the industries to  
which each section is adapted, should  
accompany the exhibit.

President Dickson, of the Commer-  
cial Association, assured Colonel  
Drake that the sympathies of the as-  
sociation and the business men of  
Pendleton were with him and the en-  
terprise he represents. A meeting of  
the association was called for 7:30 to-  
night, when the matter will be for-  
mally laid before the board of man-  
agers.

The Umatilla County Woolgrowers'  
Association was briefly addressed by  
Colonel Drake, on the objects of the  
bureau of information, and upon mo-  
tion of Secretary J. H. Gwinn, his  
remarks were unanimously indorsed  
by the meeting.

All members of the Commercial As-  
sociation are requested to be present  
tonight, to discuss the subject when  
final action will be taken.

### NEW MILL FOR GRANDE RONDE.

Fire Which Swept Away Old Build-  
ings Was Blessing in Disguise.

Island City, March 16.—The Pioneer  
Milling Company, which owns flour-  
ing mills in La Grande and in Union,  
will soon be better prepared to op-  
erate in making breadstuffs, in Island  
City than it has been before. The  
new mill and elevator cover 89x90  
feet, four stories high. The building  
is enclosed, the entire great structure  
having been erected from bottom to  
top in four weeks. The bulk of the  
machinery is already at hand. There  
are six stands of rollers and the en-  
tire machinery equipment is of the  
latest brand. Water power is obtain-  
ed from the Grande Ronde river, op-  
erating a 25-inch turbine wheel and  
developing 85 horse power.

The mill will begin running smooth-  
ly on May 1 and will daily manufac-  
ture 200 barrels of high-grade flour,  
whole wheat flour, graham and other  
choice breadstuffs.

The elevator department of the mill  
will store 65,000 bushels of wheat.

An electric lighting plant for the  
mill and also for the town's streets  
and buildings will be installed. Pow-  
er will be furnished from the mill.  
The electric equipment and machin-  
ery is due to arrive next week at Is-  
land City.

### Crops and Stock.

D. Howdyshell, who lives nine miles  
northwest, reports crops backward on  
account of the continued cold nights.  
All livestock is in fine condition.

E. A. Kidder, who lives four miles  
west, reports all crops fine, and live-  
stock also.

W. Walker, of Birch Creek, reports  
stock as in excellent condition, and  
everybody prosperous. Land in that  
neighborhood is raising in value.

E. E. Harvey, of Despair Canyon,  
was in the city Saturday. Mr. Har-  
vey reports his 500 acres of wheat as  
in fine condition, as is everybody's  
in that part of the county.

Charles Marpie, of Yonah, re-  
ports stock and crops fine, and every-  
body plowing for summer fallow.

Ed Maurer, who lives four and a  
half miles north of Pilot Rock, was in  
town Saturday. He reports hay scarce  
and stock thin. Land is raising in  
value out there and everybody is pro-  
sperous. The only land owners who  
want to sell in that neighborhood are  
a few who want to get where there is  
more range.

### Prices of Horses.

Ben Brown, the Portland horsebuy-  
er, declares that the same grades  
of good "ordinary" horses, weighing  
from 1050 to 1200 pounds, cost as  
much in Umatilla county now as they  
will bring in Portland, which fact ne-  
cessarily shuts off the industry of  
horse buying here for the Portland  
market. After all the expenses of  
shipping are figured in it is very sel-  
dom that there is more than ten dol-  
lars margin on any horse at all, while  
there is none at all on many of them.  
He says the indications are that such  
animals as he wants might be sold  
here more readily than they can be  
bought.

### GENERAL NEWS.

President Roosevelt will start on  
his western tour from Washington,  
April 1.

The board of revenue has complet-  
ed a census of China, showing it to  
have a population of 426,447,000.

A most remarkable invention has  
been made by M. R. Hutchinson, of  
Alabama, whereby the deaf can be  
made to hear.

The Canadian Pacific has started  
big immigrant specials from Montre-  
al to the northwest. Great crowds  
are arriving from London.

Owing to persistent demonstrations  
by Spanish students against the min-  
ister of public instruction the uni-  
versity of Barcelona has been closed.

Schenectady, N. Y., will be the  
scene of a general tie-up on April 1.  
The Carpenters' Union demands for  
an increase of wages has been re-  
fused.

If the Panama canal treaty is pass-  
ed by the United States senate, Wil-  
liam Cromwell, of New York, will re-  
ceive \$2,000,000, the largest fee ever  
given to a lawyer in this country.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Seattle experienced a slight earth-  
quake shock Friday night.

William Baker and Sons, of Cor-  
vallis, have been arrested for stealing  
timber and logs.

Jesse Simmons, a miner, had an eye  
knocked out while working in a mine  
near Sumpter Friday.

John D. Daly, of Benton county, has  
been named as surveyor-general of  
Oregon to succeed Henry Meldrum.

A rich gold strike has been made  
in Cave Gulch, 3 miles south of Lew-  
iston, Idaho, and a rush is now on to  
that point.

Safe blowers entered a store at Ty-  
ler, Washington, Friday night and  
secured \$100 in cash besides jewelry  
and razors.

Joseph Bartholme, a lineman of the  
Portland General Electric company,  
was killed Saturday by taking hold of  
a wire carrying 6000 volts of electric-  
ity.

Rastus A. Smith, class of 1903, of  
McMinnville College, won in the state  
oratorical contest held at the state  
university in Eugene. His subject  
was "The Homeless Nation."

A feud has sprung up between rival  
factions of the garment workers'  
union in Portland. One faction re-  
fuses to recognize the union and will  
apply for an independent charter.

A band of masked men surrounded  
the sheep camp of John Storrie near  
Douglas, Wyoming, Wednesday and  
after brutally beating the herder,  
killed 450 of the sheep and destroyed  
the camp.

The United States, through the fed-  
eral land office at Los Angeles, will  
open to settlement in the next 60  
days, about 1,000,000 acres of land in  
Southern California bordering the  
Colorado river.

King Solomon, an arrogant brute  
of a negro, who tells fortunes at Port-  
land, slapped a white woman in the  
face while on a train Friday, because  
she objected to his snoring. He is  
now in jail at Kalama.
