GENERAL NEWS.

Bulgaria's chief exports are wheat, wine and attar of roses.

The department of agriculture will have a building at a cost of \$1,500,000.

A scarlet fever epidemic has caused the closing of Lake Forest College at Chicago.

Great interest is being taken in Mexico over the Panama canal. President Diaz contemplates reaping great advantages from its construction.

The Monroe doctrine has been denounced by the papers of Chili. They object to the South Americans being treated as Turks and want to see it alone.

Boers have bought 200,000 acres of fine land near San Antonio, Texas. Their representatives say that within five years half the able bodied Boers will be in that state.

The director of physical training at Wellesley College contends that the prevailing fad for basket ball is working incalculable harm among girls because of over exertion.

Some of the most exalted persons in England are said to be implicated in the big frauds fostered by Whitaker Wright. On this fact the promoter depends to keep him out of prison.

Lady Granville Gordon, formerly an Iowa girl, recently mixed up in a divorce scandal and alleged kidnaping in London, has been branded by Queen Alexandria as a social outcast.

The strike in the concentration mills at Colorado Springs has been settled by acceding to the demands of the union strikers. They get an eight-hour day and recognition of the union.

The total value of the 1902 exports of manufactures, as shown by the figures of the treasury bureau of statistics, is \$410,650,967, against \$305,104,030 in 1901, an increase of \$105,500,000.

The California legislature has decided on \$130,000 for a state exhibit at the World's fair, St. Louis. This will be in addition to the county appropriation which will exceed the state appropriation.

Alcoholic degenerates are especially prone to become self accusers, offering themselves to authorities as guilty of crimes committed by others or confessing guilt for acts which have occurred only in their imaginations.

Jack Iverly, of Portland, while drunk, attempted to commit suicide at St. Helens, early Monday morning. He stabbed himself with a penknife, in the neck, but will recover.

Detective Ford, of Portland, has been awarded \$350 by the state of Washington, for arresting the defaulting assistant state auditor of Washington, a few years ago.

GIRL SUICIDES.

Miss Buchholz Takes Morphine While Despondent.

Death at her own hand, by swallowing 10 grains of morphine in a fit of despondency, was the fate of Maud Buchholz, daughter of Mrs. Jennie Blackburn, of this city, at Spokane, Saturday morning, says the Walla Walla Statesman. Mrs. Blackburn was notified Saturday evening of the death of her daughter, and yesterday morning left for Spokane. The body will be brought to this city for interment.

Spokane papers say it appears to have been a case of the little country girl wearying of the fast whirl of city life. For fear that she would lose the man she loved, she preferred death and took the easiest route she knew. She had been melancholy for several days and quarreled with her lover, Fred Groskopf, a bartender at Friday night about 8 o'clock took 10 grains of morphine but did not die until 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

There was an investigation by the coroner, Dr. G. A. Downs was called to attend the dying woman about midnight, but she was past medical aid. She was known in the Eagle building as Mrs. Groskopf, and was formerly known as Maud Heisey.

J. W. Cookerly received word this morning that the remains would be shipped to this city tomorrow afternoon. The funeral will take place from his parlors Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock.
