FREE READING ROOM AND LI-BRARY AT GRANT'S PASS.

It is Conditioned on Raising \$500 Annually for Maintenance-Work of the Woman's Club.

Grant's Pass, Ore., March 17 .- This ity is to receive \$5000 from Andrew Carnegie for the establishment of a free reading room and library. The promise of this amount of money from the philanthropist has been brought about through the efforts of the Grant's Pass Woman's Club, which has been working for some time in the matter of establishing a library here

Several months ago they began the task of reaching Mr. Carnegie by let-ter, and, at last, through his 14th or 15th secretary, comes the reply that the \$5000 asked for will be forthcoming when the city of Grant's Pass stands ready to pledge the required \$500 annually for the support of the library after it is established, for Mr. Carnegie will not build libraries unless he can be assured they will remain permanent fixtures.

In general the citizens of Grant's Pass are heartily in favor of the li-brary, and the Woman's Club feels certain that the pledge of \$500 annually can be secured. The matter will probably go through the city council ways and means for securing the pledge will be discussed.

The Woman's Club is accomplishing much for the good of Grant's Pass. The club here is the strongest in the state, proportion to population, and is recognized as the leading organization of any character in Southern Oregon.



JOURNAL OF JASON LEE IS OREGON'S PROPERTY

First Missionary in the Northwest-Journal Opens With Arrival at Liberty, Mo.-Recounts Settlement of Early Oregon.

Portland, March 17 .- A most nota-Oregon Historical Society was re-ceived yesterday. Mrs. H. K. Hines, widow of H. K. Hines ,D. D., presented to the society the journal of Jason Lee, the superintendent of the first missionary work in the Pacific Northwest. The movement which Jason Lee led, contributed what was for some years probably the most influential element in the early Oregon settlement.

The journal opens with the record of the arrival of Lee and his party at Liberty, Mo., April 20, 1834: They were joined by Captain Nathaniel J. Wyeth's second expedition in its outward trip. The first break in the record occurs on November 9, 1834, when Lee became too much engrossed in arduous work of establishing the sas City, St. Joe, Omaha, and mission in its quarters near Champoeg.

After an interval of nearly three years, on August 18, 1837, Lee takes up his literary task again, complain-MAPLE BROS. COURT STREET, GENeral Electrical supplies. He seems to find, however, that the renewal of health and vigor and the keeping up of his diary are incompatible for him and he soon relinquishes his task. The remainder of the journal is taken up with his trip to the Umpqua and his journey East in 1838. When he reopens his record he commonly gives a summary of the hap penings during the period through which the narrative had lapsed.

The document is in the best state of preservation. Taken along with Lee's reports to his home board it no doubt comprises nearly all of the literary remains of this father of Ore-The deepest gratitude is due to those who have so carefully preserved it and have now tendered it to the state.

GOOD ROADS.

Was Subject of Discussion at Annual Meeting of Ohio State Board of Commerce.

Columbus, O., March 17.-Prominent business men from all quarters of the state were present today and took part in the discussion of the annual meeting of the Ohio State Board of Commerce. The discussions covered a wide range of subjects, but all aimed at improving the welfare of the state and its people. Good roads, the uniformity of public accounting laws, and the want of a uniform law for warehouse receipts were discussed at considerable length, and the three constitutional amendments to be voted on at the state election next November also came in for much attention.

Left Today for Mobile, Where They Will Go in Training for Season.

Chicago, March 17.-The Chicago ball players of the American League team celebrated St. Patrick's day today by shaking the winter's dust from their feet and frisking away for the balmy climate of Alabama. team will not stop, according to Manager Comiskey, until it reaches Mo-bile, where 10 days will be spent in preliminary training.
