INDIAN VETERANS

SURVIVORS OF OREGON WARS
IN WALLA WALLA.

Review of the Situation and Opinion
of Washington Paper on Oregon
Law—Claimants Will Try to Recov-
er Back Pay.

There are probably a half dozen
veterans of the Indian war of 1855-56
in Walla Walla county who will bene-
fit by the act passed by the Oregon
legislature to compensate them for
services, says the Walla Walla Union.
In all there are probably 800 who
come within the provisions of the
act.

Attorney W. F. Crowe has received
a copy of the act from Adjutant-Gen-
eral C. U. Gantenbein of Oregon, to-
gether with a blank claim and in-
structions to claimants.

The act appropriates \$100,000 from
the general fund of the state of Ore-
gon, and provides that each non-com-
missioned officer and private who
served Oregon Territory in the In-
dian wars of 1855-56 shall be entitled
to receive for such services the sum
of \$2 per day for himself, and all
commissioned officers shall receive
such sum as was paid to officers of the
same rank of the army of the United
States at that time; provided, that
any amount paid on account thereof
by the United States shall be deduct-
ed.

In regard to the construction, "Shall
be entitled to receive for such ser-
vices the sum of \$2 per day for him-
self," the attorney-general of Oregon
has held that neither the widow nor
the heirs of a deceased volunteer is
entitled to compensation for services
rendered by him, so that only surviv-
ing volunteers are entitled to the
compensation provided for in the
act. Attorney Crowe, however, is of
the opinion that under the spirit of
the act the widows and heirs of de-
ceased volunteers are entitled to re-
ceive compensation.

The act further provides that the
claim for such services, verified by
the claimant, shall be presented to
the adjutant general, who shall ex-
amine and pass upon the same, and
may require additional and corroborat-
ing evidence. The secretary of state
will then issue warrants for the
amount found to be due claimants.

So far as it relates to volunteers
the act is to be so construed as to
apply to all who were in the service
of the territory of Oregon during the
Indian wars of 1855-56, and is extend-
ed to the Ninth regiment of the Ore-
gon militia while it was in actual
service during the war.

The territory of Oregon, by act of
the legislature passed on January 24,
1856, promised to pay the veterans
serving in the Indian wars the same
compensation as provided for in the
recent enactment. However, neither
the territory nor the state of Oregon
has paid the volunteers for their ser-
vices. Many of them have died with-
out being compensated for their
losses in the war.

STUBBLEFIELD WILL.

Mrs. Stubblefield Accepts the \$6000
Left Her By Will.

Yesterday evening the executors of
the will of the late Joseph L. Stubble-
field, who are also trustees under the
will of the home for orphans and in-
digent widows to be established in
Walla Walla, made settlement with
Cassan Stubblefield, widow of the de-
ceased whereby legal proceedings in-
stituted by her for the setting aside
of the will were stopped, says the
Walla Walla Union. Under the pro-
visions of the will Mrs. Stubblefield
was to receive \$6000, and this, so far
as was given out, is what she will re-
ceive in the final settlement.

The trustees, R. M. Dorothy, E. A.
Reser and C. M. Rader, had been
working on the basis of settlement
agreed to for three days, and it was
on the advice of Barton A. McGuire,
of Idaho, brother of Mrs. Stubblefield,
and George McGuire, ex-county audi-
tor of this county, her nephew, that
she withdrew opposition to the carry-
ing out of the provisions of the will.

C. M. Rader, one of the trustees,
said last night that Mrs. Stubblefield
is the only heir at law, and the only
person who has the right to question
the validity of the terms of the will.
If this be so there is now no obstacle
in the way of the establishment of
the home for orphans in Walla Walla.
The trustees say the legatees will
be paid off as rapidly as possible, and
that after all expenses connected with
the disposition of their trust have
been paid, including \$10,000 inher-
itance tax, there will remain an en-
dowment for the home of about \$120,
000.

EX-PRESIDENT OF WHITMAN.

A. J. Anderson, Formerly of Walla
Walla, Dead.

Walla Walla, March 18.—Alexander
Jay Anderson, formerly president of
Whitman College, and father of Pro-
fessor L. F. Anderson, of this city,
died in St. Peter's hospital at Olym-
pia, Tuesday morning. News of his
demise was conveyed to this city
about noon. The remains will be
shipped to this city today. The funeral
will take place tomorrow after-
noon at 2 o'clock from the residence
of Professor L. F. Anderson in Boyer
avenue.

Services will be conducted by Rev.
Austin Rice, pastor of the First Con-
gregational church, and President
Penrose, of Whitman, and will be at-
tended by Whitman students in a
body.

Professor Anderson left for Olym-
pia last week, to be at the bedside of
his father.

Mr. Cleveland Now Aged 66.

Princeton, N. J., March 18.—For-
mer President Cleveland spent this,
his 66th birthday quietly at his home,
on Baynard Lane, with his wife and
children. To the several callers who
were informally received during the
day he appeared to be in a happy
frame of mind and talked freely on
all subjects except politics. regard-
ing the last-named subject he con-

tent himself with reiterating the
views expressed on the occasion of
his recent visit to New York. As a
pleasant birthday reminder there
poured in during the day congrat-
ulatory messages from friends and ad-
mirers in many parts of the country.
