SURVIVORS OF OREGON WARS IN WALLA WALLA

Review of the Situation and Opinion of Washington Paper on Oregon Law-Claimants Will Try to Recov-

er Back Pay. There are probably a half dozen veterans of the Indian war of 1855-56 Walla Walla county who will benefit by the act passed by the Oregon legislature to compensate them for services, says the Walla Walla Union. In all there are probably 800 who come within the provisions of the

Attorney W. F. Crowe has received a copy of the act from Adjutant-General C. U. Gantenbein of Oregon, together with a blank claim and instructions to claimants.

The act appropriates \$100,000 from the general fund of the state of Oregon, and provides that gon, and provides that each non-commissioned officer and private who served Oregon Territory in the Indian wars of 1855-56 shall be entitled to receive for such services the sum of \$2 per day for himself, and all commissioned officers shall receive such sum as was paid to officers of the same rank of the army of the United States at that time; provided, that any amount paid on account thereof by the United States shall be deduct-

In regard to the construction, "Shall be entitled to receive for such services the sum of \$2 per day for himself," the attorney-general of Oregon has held that neither the widow nor the heirs of a deceased volunteer is entitled to compensation for services rendered by him, so that only surviving volunteers are entitled to the compensation provided for the in the Attorney Crowe, however, is of the opinion that under the spirit of the act the widows and heirs of deceased volunteers are entitled to receive compensation.

The act further provides that the claim for such services, verified the claimant, shall be presented to the adjutant general, who shall examine and pass upon the same, and may require additional and corroboraevidence. The secretary of state will then issue warrants for the

amount found to be due claimants. So far as it relates to volunteers the act is to be so constructed as to apply to all who were in the service of the territory of Oregon during the Indian wars of 1855-56, and is extended to the Ninth regiment of the Oregon militia while it was in actual service during the war.

The territory of Oregon, by act of the legislature pased on January 24, 1856, promised to pay the veterans serving in the Indian wars the same compensation as provided for in the recent enactment. However, neither the territory nor the state of Oregon has paid the volunteers for their serv-Many of them have died without being compensated for their losses in the war.

If this be so there is now no obstacle in the way of the establishment of

the home for orphans in Walla Walla. The trustees say the legatees will be paid off as rapidly as possible, and that after all expenses connected with the disposition of their trust have been paid, including \$10,000 inheritance tax, there will remain an endowment for the home of about \$120,-






