ATHENA'S NEW CHURCH.

Plans and Specifications Have Been Decided Upon.

At a meeting of the officers and members of the Methodist church Tuesday afternoon, Mr. Troutman, the Pendleton architect, submitted plans and specifications for the new church building, says the Press. On presentation, the cost was estimated at \$7,000, or \$1,000 more than was anticipated when subscriptions were solicited by Mr. Armfield, the pastor.

To cut the building plans down to conform with a \$6,000 building would interfere to a certain extent in the matter of convenience, and it was at once decided to build the \$7,000 edifice.

The plans call for a building 65x83 feet. The lower story or basement will be of stone and the upper story will be constructed of brick. The lower floor will embrace the parlor, Epworth League room, a kindergarten room, the kitchen and heating apparatus.

On the upper floor will be the main auditorium, lecture room, the pastor's study and the gallery. The capacity of the auditorium, together with the gallery and lecture room, will seat 600 persons.

The old church building will be offered for sale at once, and when it is disposed of, excavation for the new building will commence.

Church Dedication Tomorrow.

The new Christian church at Athena will be dedicated Sunday, March 22. Services will be held at 11 a. m., 3 p. m. and 7:30 p. m. During the revival which has been in progress there for several days past, 50 accessions to the church have been made.

Men of Many Faiths.

San Francisco, March 21.—The three days' session of the World's Congress of Religions, scheduled to commence today at Leland Stanford University, is attracting much attention. The gathering is under the same auspices as the congress originated at the Chicago World's Fair, being composed of men of all creeds and faiths. The participants are to include among others, Rabbi Hirsch and Jenkin Lloyd Jones, the eminent Chicago divines, who were among the originators and leaders of the movement.
