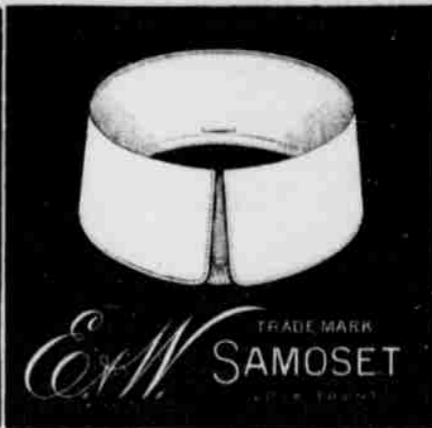
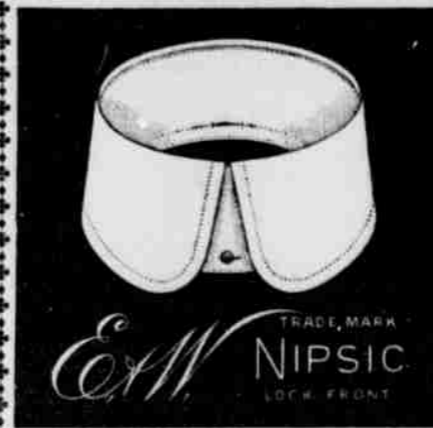

Petitions in Bankruptcy.

Petitions in bankruptcy were filed this morning by Halley & Lowell before Referee Fitz Gerald in two cases. Jeremiah Barnhart of this place, sets forth that his liabilities are \$11,480.32 and his assets nothing at all. Nathan H. Sams, of Milton, puts his liabilities at \$3,001.86 and his assets at \$115, and claims exemption for the entire amount of the latter.

Encourages Deception.
