Says the Kansas Man Practiced Ignominious Treachery-Violated the Laws of War. Laws of Hospitality and Laws of God.

eral Funston, and criticised the American people for condoning what he called the "deceit and treachery" practiced by Funston in making the celebrated capture that utterly couraged all other beiligerent Philip-pine leaders. "Wherefore putting away lying, speaking every man truth

with his neighbor," was the text.
"A deplorable illustration of the general apathy upon the matter," he said, "was shown by the easy popular assent given to the ignominious treachery practicey upon the Filipino leader, Aguinaldo, by our army offi-cer, Funston—a treachery ordered and approved by General MacArthur. The facts in the case were these: Funston disguised himself and some of his men in the uniform worn Filipinos, crept in upon Aguinaldo stealthily under that guise, tricked him by a forged letter, pretending that they were hungry, made capital out of a holy right of hospitality, and then flung Aguinaldo to the ground and made him captive: violated the laws of war, the laws of hospitality, and the laws of God."

Dr. Pakhurst concluded by saying:
"I have not lived to my age withut knowing what internal and infernal lies I sometimes tell myself, and how desperately hard I sometimes work in the effort to fool myself. And I would stake all I am worth on the assertion that in this particular you assertion that in this particular you are just like me: Insincere, evasive, knowing God, slinking off into the woods with the serpent; fascinated with the face of Jesus, daubing his face with an amalgam of lust and higher criticism; knowing duty, lying out of it; beholding God, crouching behind the test. behind the tree.

"It would not seem as bad in us to crawl if it had not been God's inten-tion for us that we should be only a little lower than the angels.



Transportation Companies Put Ten New Vessels on Lakes.

Duluth, Minn., March 24.-The Duluth, Minn., March 24.—The Great Lakes & St. Lawrence Transportation Company of Duluth, will put into commission during the season, about to open 10 steel steamships for the export trade between the upper lakes and Europe. The service will be a new and important one and it is understood that a large trade has been worked up, not only in grain and flour, but in some heavy manu-factured goods, which have been handicapped heretofore for the export market on account of excessive

Ireights. The fleet will run from the head of the lakes through to Quebec and Mon-treal, where the cargoes will be trans-shipped. In order that they may car-ry cargoes of size through the Cana-dian canals to salt water, the new vessels are to be more than 225 feet long. They will have a capacity of 2,600 tons, however, and will carry 2,200 tons on the 14-foot draught permitted by the present Canadian ca-
