Water Works at Adams.

W. M. Baker, Alvin Stone and Harry Sears are running the preliminary survey for the locating of the mains for the new water works at Adams. The new works, which are to cost \$5,000, will be owned by the city. The system includes fire hydrants at every needed place, and a standpipe which will afford a pressure that will easily reach every roof in the city. In fact, it is expected that there will be a large surplus of both water and pressure. The new system supplants an old-fashioned hand engine, and puts Adams in the front ranks of the smaller towns so far as water supply and protection against fire are concerned.

Oregon's "Spa."

Dr. G. W. Tape, manager of the Hot Lake sanitarium on the O. R. & N. near Union, which is becoming the greatest health resort in the Northwest, is in the city today, accompanied by Walter M. Pierce, of Pendleton, one of the principal owners of the hot lake. Immense improvements are being made at the resort.—Baker City Herald.

SPECIAL SCHOOL ELECTION.

It Has Been Learned That \$25,000 Can Be Made to Build Two School-houses.
The prospect and intention now is to let the special school election called for tomorrow go by default by consent.
The primary reason for this is that careful estimates made subsequent to the original estimates upon which the terms of the pending propositions were based, have disclosed that the figure named in the pending proposition—\$25,000—can be made to go much farther in providing an increased school privileges than the terms of the proposition admit.
It has been ascertained that the \$25,000 can be made to erect the eight-room house proposed for the site of the old academy and in addition a substantial, well-built and arranged two-room schoolhouse. Hence the present scheme to let the election tomorrow go by default for the purpose of having another special election called, the proposition for which shall incorporate an obligation to build an eight-room house on this side and a two-room house on the north side, where a schoolhouse is very badly needed. The understanding being that the failure to hold an election tomorrow shall be supplemented by a call for another election, to be made very soon.
