ACTING GRAND MATRON.

Mrs. John Vert to Visit the Lodges of O. E. S. in Eastern Oregon While Mrs. Townsend is Detained at Her Home.

On account of Grand Matron Allie Townsend of the Eastern Star being detained at home by the protracted illness of her husband, at Dallas, Mrs. John Vert will be acting grand matron for some weeks at least. Mrs. Vert is by no means a stranger to the duties of the position, as she once held it herself, and in that capacity visited every lodge of the O. E. S. in the state, prior to her tour in Europe. Mrs. Vert will visit the order at Weston tonight. Other appointments on this mission which she has made in this part of the state are as follows: Summerville, April 13; La Grande, April 22; Elgin, April 24. From Elgin she will go into the Wallowa valley.

Another Amateur Team.

A baseball nine is being organized from the ranks of the expressmen and other transfer people in the city. D. B. Waffle is manager and E. M. Turner captain. Only two or three of the positions have as yet been decided upon, but the organization will be completed very soon. The new team issues a sweepstakes challenge to play any amateur nine in the city of Pendleton, including the winner of the Boston Store-Peoples Warehouse game of Sunday next.

It is sincerely hoped that the defendants will be able to prove an alibi, or that it is a case of mistaken identity pure and simple.

Castings Made.

A small part of the machinery for the Rigby-Glove harvester works has not yet arrived, but is expected daily. The foundry department is in operation and several completed castings have been turned out. It is declared of them that they are as fine castings as ever reached this neighborhood as component parts of any farm machinery shipped in from the East.

ABOUT IRRIGATION

IN '99 THERE WERE 329 UMATILLA IRRIGATED FARMS.

The Cost to Irrigate Those Farms Was \$36,602—Value of Crops, \$118,923—Cost Only \$7.11 Per Acre to Bring Under Irrigation.

Delman V. Kuykendall, of Eugene, representing the federal census department, is in the city, the guest of the Hotel St. George.

He is directly representing the bureau of wealth, debt and taxation, and is collecting statistics as to the receipts, expenditures, assessed values, tax rates, resources and liabilities of counties and municipalities in this state. This is the third county he has visited on this mission, the others being Baker and Union. He is also collecting irrigation statistics, and from them some very interesting facts are gleaned.

In 1899 there were in the state 4,636 irrigated farms of greater or less extent, of which 329 were in Umatilla county. This county showed an increase in the number of irrigated farms from 1889 to 1899 of 122.3 per cent. In 1899 there were in the state 388,310 irrigated acres, of which 5,168 were in Umatilla county.

The cost of the ditches in operation in the state in 1899 was \$1,838,782. The ditches in operation in Umatilla county in that year cost \$36,602. The value of the crops produced that year in the entire state from irrigated ground in Umatilla county that year was \$118,923, divided as follows: hay and forage, \$59,289; small fruits, \$23,317; orchard fruits, \$8,456; vegetables, \$20,296; cereals, \$3,636; other crops, \$3,929. Definite and reliable statistics as to the increase in length of ditches, cost, area irrigated and value of products during the past four years cannot yet be had, and will not be obtainable until about July 1 next, when they will be sent out from the federal census department. The collection of such information is in progress now.

A very interesting bit of information in this connection is that the average original cost per acre of bringing the land under water that was irrigated in this county in 1899 was only \$7.11. This being the original cost merely, no item of repairs or running expenses being considered. The same year—1899—the average value per acre of the products from the irrigated lands in this county was \$23, the balance being nearly three to one on the profit side of the account.

One thing that should not be forgotten is that the average cost per acre for getting land under water in Oregon is somewhat less than the average cost per acre throughout the entire United States. This is because of the number and proximity of the streams flowing through the semi-arid regions, which are cut up into comparatively small districts by the numerous mountain ranges from which the streams flow. On this account the main ditches are usually much shorter than ditches of the same capacity in almost any other irrigated portion of the United States. The loss of water from evaporation and seepage is much less.

Special School Election.

The question of calling another special school election by the board has been postponed until the return of Senator Pierce from La Grande, as the other members regard as essential that all the members of the board shall be present. It was thought that Mr. Pierce would return today, so the meeting of the board could be held tonight; but he will not arrive in the city until tomorrow, so the probabilities are that the terms of the special bond election will be formally drafted tomorrow evening, and a date set at the same meeting for the election.

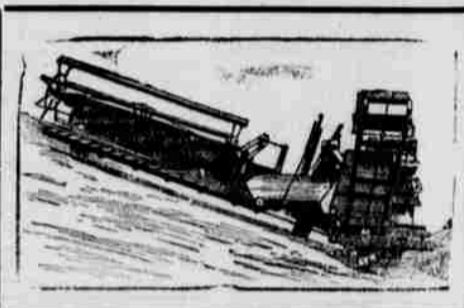
