CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS.

State Superintendent Ackerman Thinks There Should Be But One Normal School in Oregon.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Ackerman says he would prefer but one state normal school, and that the state pay students' transportation to and from this school, to the four normal schools which the state maintains.

He is right; one first-class school, one of as high grade as any in the country, would be preferable to four inferior schools, and it would be cheaper to pay the students' fares, as the superintendent suggests, than to maintain the three extra schools. But there is no prospect that such a change will be made. It has been easy for the state to acquire normal schools under the log-rolling process of legislation, but to get rid of any of them will be difficult, if not impossible.

Whether the proposed consolidation of country schools, or of such country schools as are within a few miles of a town school with the latter, is a good policy, and how far it can be successfully carried out, are questions upon which those interested will not agree. But it would seem safe to rely to a great extent on the judgment of Superintendent Ackerman and other experienced teachers.—Portland Telegram.
