

"Barbarous countries and states have no strikes; they are unknown there. Strikers are the sledgehammers that weld the connecting links of la bor and capital and make the endiess chain of prosperity. We want a bet-ter understanding between employer and employe, and we come with offerthe ministers' trust and the money trust, only we call those associations selves unions.

It is said the United railroads will not grant the demands of the car men's union for increased ings of peace. The labor unions are trusts just like your doctors trust, and, so far as the demands of the men for the recognition of the union is concerned, the company will offer a compromise proposition in which it will agree to the settlement of disputes between the company and its men, at the same time denying the right of the union to interfere in the employment or discharge of employes.

New York, March 28.—The great fair in the interests of organized labor fair in the interests of organized labor for which preparations have been making all winter, opens in the Grand Central Palace tonight. The promoters expect that not less than 200,000 persons will visit it before the close April 5, and that fully \$25,000 will be cleared. The trades unions, the workingmen's sick and death benefit societies and kindred organizations are cieties and kindred organizations are working for its success. All sorts of entertainments have been arranged for and hundreds of donations valued into the thousands have been secured. The money realized is to form a fund for the general aid of the labor movement in Greater New York

Hogs Pay. The high price of hogs which has prevailed in the Northwest for nearly two years is having the effect of en-couraging the raising of hogs in this country and farmers are constantly increasing the size of their breeding herds and preparing to produce pork at less cost than formerly. To do this they are fencing their farms with hog-light wire fences and are thus enabled to raise hogs by letting them "pick their living" from the stubble fields after the grain is harvested. In this way a large number of hogs can be fed on a farm of 160 acres at a

very light expense.

D. W. Boone, a pioneer farmer, who owns a large farm at Union flat, 10 miles north of here, today bought wire from a local hardware firm to fence 400 acres with hog-light wire and will raise hors on an extensive. and will raise hogs on an extensive scale. The sales of this wire are larger this spring than ever known.
