GENERAL NEWS.

The threatened carmen's strike in San Francisco has been averted and both parties have agreed to arbitrate.

The cooks' and waiters' strike in Denver is becoming serious. Seventy-four restaurants are now closed and the grocers', butchers' and bakers' clerks talk of a sympathetic strike.

Ten thousand machinists laid down their tools April 1 at Greenwich, Conn., the builders and contractors having refused to arbitrate their differences.

President Firth, of the Seattle Electric Company, has declined to arbitrate with the streetcar strikers in that city, and the strike seems further from settlement than ever before.

Saturday a pitched fight took place at Black Rock, Ariz., between a company of Arizona rangers and a bunch of cattle thieves. The rangers were repulsed and fell back for reinforcements.

A terrible explosion occurred Tuesday in the coal mine near Sandoval, Ill. Six men have been taken out badly burned and 15 are still imprisoned in the mine, which is said to be on fire.

The Colorado strikers have declined to amend their demands as a result of a 12-hour conference held Monday night by President Mayer and other officials of the Western Federation of Miners.

Rear Admiral Schley left Portland Tuesday evening for Seattle.

Smith, the negro murderer, of Portland, has been denied a new hearing.

William B. Moreing, of The Dalles, committed suicide Tuesday by taking arsenic.

Silas Williams, of Lower Burnt River, Baker county, dropped dead Tuesday, while plowing.

Astoria fishermen are agitating a 10 per cent raise in the price of salmon for the season of 1903.

Some of the old members of the Carman's Union of Tacoma are deserting the ranks and returning to work.

The petitions for a referendum vote on the Portage railway and corporation tax law are not being generally signed.

The Seattle grand jury has returned 18 indictments against city officials, including the mayor and chief of police.

Governor Chamberlain delivered an address before the board of corrections and charities at Portland Tuesday afternoon.

Frank Kane and Elden Trogan, aged 12 and 14, were arrested in Portland Tuesday for shoplifting in Lipman & Wolf's store.

Wild geese are reported to be plentiful on the Lower Columbia. Hunters say they are remarkably fat for this season of the year.

WINS DAMAGE SUIT.

D. M. Radley Gets Judgment Against the Columbia Southern.

The first damage case of any importance to Columbia Southern railroad has had to meet was tried in the circuit court at Moro yesterday and the day before, and resulted in a verdict against the company for \$5,382. An action was brought against the company by D. M. Radley for \$20,000 damages alleged to have been due for injuries sustained by the plaintiff, who some time ago boarded an engine going from Wasco to Biggs, which turned over near Biggs, and injured Radley. The railroad company held that as passengers were forbidden to ride on engines it was not responsible, but the jury evidently took a different view. W. H. Wilson of this city conducted the case for Radley.—Chronicle.

WARNS SETTLERS

CIRCULAR ISSUED TO PUBLIC BY SECRETARY HITCHCOCK.

Says Lands in Irrigation Reservations Are Only Temporarily Withdrawn—Government is Simply Prospecting for Sites and May Abandon All Plans.

The secretary of the interior has issued a circular letter warning settlers from undue haste in locating upon government lands upon which preliminary irrigation surveys may be in progress.

The idea prevails to a large extent, that the beginning of preliminary work upon irrigation schemes in the West, is evidence that the government will complete the reclamation of that tract of land or reservation included in the withdrawal. Such is not the case.

The government is simply prospecting and for a number of reasons may abandon any sites upon which surveys have been made.

There must be something more than preliminary work, more than prospecting, to insure settlers that the lands located near a proposed scheme of irrigation will be reclaimed.

Recognizing the need of protection for settlers from unscrupulous locators and irrigation "boomers," the interior department has issued the plain circular for the benefit of innocent parties.

The circular is addressed to the registers of land offices and is as follows:

"You are hereby directed in addition to the instructions contained in office circular of September 9, 1902, to call the especial attention of all persons that have made, or are intending to make, homestead entries on lands that have been, or may hereafter be, temporarily withdrawn for irrigation purposes, to the following statement:

"Withdrawal of these lands is principally for the purpose of making surveys and irrigation investigations, in order to determine the feasibility of the plans of irrigation and reclamation proposed. Only a portion of the lands will be irrigated, even if the project is feasible. It will be impossible to decide in advance of careful examination what lands may be watered, if any. The mere fact surveys are in progress is no indication whatever that the works will be built, and this fact cannot determine how much water there may be available, or what lands can be covered, or whether the cost will be too great to justify the undertaking, until the surveys and the irrigation investigation have been completed.

"Attention is also called to the fact that all entries made upon the lands referred to are subject to the following proviso of the act of August 30, 1890 (26 Stat. 291):

"That in all patents for lands hereafter taken up under any of the land laws of the United States or on entries or claims validated by this act west of the 100th meridian, it shall be expressed that there is reserved from the lands in said patent described a right of way thereon for ditches or canals constructed by the authority of the United States."

"Under this provision of the law, should a homestead entry embrace land that is needed in whole or in part for a dam site, a reservoir, or a canal, the land would be taken for such purpose, and the entryman would have no claim against the United States for the taking of such right of way.

"You will post a copy of this circular in a conspicuous place in your office and give the subject-matter hereof such general publicity as may be possible. Very respectfully,

SLEEPING TO DEATH.

Strange Case of a Young Woman in a Utah Hospital.

Salt Lake, March 31.—Physicians of this city, more particularly those attached to the staff of the Holy Cross hospital, are at a loss to account for the condition of Miss Bessie Knecht, 22 years of age, who for the past 28 days has been asleep. During that time the young lady has not spoken a word, nor had, to all appearances, a waking moment.

After the first week of her long slumber, she was taken from the home of her parents in this city and removed to the hospital, where, despite numerous efforts on the part of the physicians to arouse her, her condition remains unchanged. She lies with closed eyes, breathing naturally day after day and night after night. At long intervals she raises her eyelids a little but never opens them. When tapped on the forehead she is seemingly annoyed, but gives no other evidence of consciousness.

She is fed at intervals with liquid food, which she swallows automatically, when it is poured down her throat, but in spite of this nourishment she is gradually wasting away, and the physicians believe that should her present condition continue, she will pass from sleep to death through the exhaustion of the vital forces.

BOXING CHAMPIONSHIPS.

Will be Held Under Auspices of Riverside Club at Boston Today and Tomorrow.

Boston, Mass., April 1.—For the first time in the history of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, the boxing championships of the national association are to be held in this vicinity—under the auspices of the Riverside Boat Club, Cambridgeport, this evening and tomorrow evening. The entry list indicates that the tournament will be exceptionally good this year in quality as well as quantity.

The following events will be contested: Bantamweight, 105 pounds and under; featherweight, 115 pounds and under; special weight, 125 pounds and under; lightweight, 135 pounds and under; welterweight, 145 pounds and under; middleweight, 158 pounds and under; heavyweight, over 158 pounds.

Toronto, Ont., March 31.—Arrangements have been made by the veterans of the second C. M. R. to celebrate the anniversary of the battle of Hart's River by a reunion and dinner here tonight. 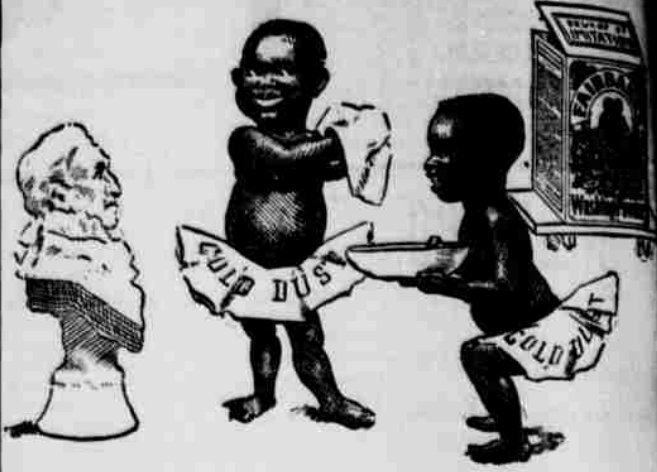

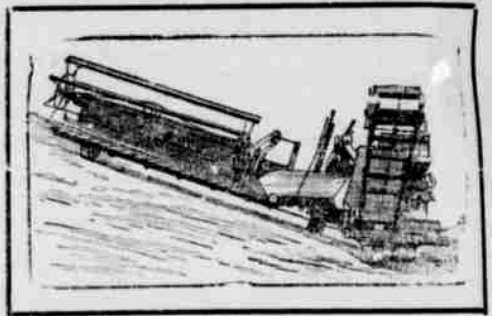
