## AT THE RACE TRACK

FINE LIST OF HORSES NOW IN TRAINING.

Brief Description of Animals Now Being Prepared for the Track With List of the Old Celebrities Trained Here.

The superiority of the Eastern Oregon horse is too well established to require any further proof. There seems to be something in our climate and feed that gives hardhood and bottom to the horses bred here. Not only do they develop wonderful hardiness, but they develop speed as well. The celebrated Chehalis is sufficient proof of this assertion.

In company with C. A. Chapman an East Oregonian representative drove out to the half-mile race course east of town to look over the string of horses being trained there.

It is a regulation half mile track and is said to be one of the fastest in Eastern Oregon. It is owned by G. E. Peringer.

The weather conditions of the past few days have put it in splendid condition.

The Stock in Training.

Just as we drove up we saw a good finish between Nancy Cole and Ollie M. Nancy Cole is a 6-year-old, a green trotter, but one with excellent prospects. She is a Westfield mare and will give a good account of herself. Ollie M is not only a good looker, but a good goer as well.

She is a pacer, and has a 2-year-old record of 2:19 1/4, which she made at the state fair at North Yakima. She is one of the speediest of her class brought out in Eastern Oregon. Last year in a race with older horses she stepped off her half mile in 1:03. Her 2-year-old track record is 2:11 1/4. She is to prove of what metal she is made at the next state fair when she will contest for the "Greater Salem" stake for \$2000 in the 2:17 class.

While we were there A. E. Heller, one of the trainers held the stopwatch on Nancy Cole and Ollie M. on a mile heat. One of the eighths they made in 19 seconds and the quarter in 39 1/4. This is better than a 2:40 gait and they were not being urged, in fact they had lots of speed in reserve and when they came in did not seem very warm.

Ollie M. is owned by Jim Erwin, and Nancy Cole by G. E. Peringer.

Another promising youngster being trained there is Eddie B. who will go in the 2-year-old class at the coming state fair. He is sired by Bonner N. B. and is the property of Mr. Erwin.

Medium Caution, a 3-year-old of unknown possibilities, having considerable promise, however, is being developed. Sam Purdy, of Athena, is its owner. Another of the youngsters that is being brought into shape is a little 2-year-old Westfield mare, the property of James Furnish.

Oveta is one that is expected to watch the others come in over shoulder. Her track record is 2:15 1/4, but her trainer will be disappointed if she

doesn't clip 5 seconds off of that record this season. She is of the Caution stock. Kitty Clover, out of Kitty Caution, by Pricemont, is showing up well. She is owned and worked by Mark Lynch, of Walla Walla.

A Fast Pacer.

One of the fastest pacers on the track for the amount of work he has had, is a 3-year-old owned by Louis Audit, of Adams. He gives promise of developing considerable speed. He traces his ancestry back to Hamilton 10. George McDonald has a son of Westfield, a 4-year-old green trotter named Duke Ravell that is being worked. It is too soon to make any predictions concerning him as he has not been worked much yet. He comes of good stock and should develop speed.

Two of the handsomest animals at the track are Uno and Ino. They are the property of C. A. Chapman. Uno is a grandson of Chehalis. His dam by Blackberry and he by Whippleton. He is a 4-year-old, 16 1/2 hands high, weighing 1212 pounds. Black and glossy, with a beautifully arched neck, he is a very handsome animal. Ino has just been clipped and has a sheen and luster to his coat like a gray-blue changeable silk. In addition to his satiny coat he has the lines of his racing ancestry. Like Uno, he is a grandson of the world-beating Chehalis.

Celebrities of the Past.

Some celebrated horses have received their training on this track. Among the number is Pathmark, a brown stallion foaled in 1896; sired by Pathmont, 2:09 1/4, son of Altamont. His dam, Juliet 2:22, is by Tybalt, a son of Altamont. Pathmark's track record is 2:11 1/4.

Mack Mack, whose record is 2:15 1/4 is another animal that received his training on this track. Mack Mack is a half brother of Bonner N. B. 2:17. Nancy being their mother. Mt. Hood 2:19. Alta Norte 2:16 1/4. Phil N. 2:19. Oveta 2:15. Boner N. B. John Edison 2:16. Starkey 2:15 1/4. Francisco 2:18. Oregon Sunshine who took the Northwest record for 3-year-olds. Saltesse, Santiam and many other celebrated horses have been developed on this track. It is astonishing how many speedy horses have come from Umatilla county.

South of town is located the Frazier track. The king of this track is Westfield. Here Frank Frazier has developed such noted horses as Hassalo 2:15 1/4 and Umahalis the daughter of Chehalis. Here was trained that king of the turf, Chehalis, with a mile record of 2:04 1/4 and a world-breaking 2-mile record of 4:19 1/4.

Eastern Oregon is certainly the home of the horse, for where will you find harder or speedier horses than in this particular section of the Inland Empire.
