NEWS FROM ECHO

TOWN OF ECHO TO BE MOVED ACROSS THE RIVER.

Many People Looking for Claims—Settlers to Go Into the Bee Business—Petition Circulated for Re-appointment of Postmaster Dorn.

Echo, April 3.—A team belonging to Joe Vey became frightened at the depot here and as a result his back is badly demolished. A span of mules belonging to O. G. Allen, also took a dash against time down Main street, breaking the pole to his back. Fortunately, no serious damage was done in either case.

Gay Haden and C. E. McCumber, of Pendleton; George W. Nowles and N. R. Hill, of Lewiston, are among the visitors today.

Asie Thompson of Butter Creek, was in this morning. He will leave for La Grande tomorrow to assume his duties in the United States land office.

The Butter Creek Telephone Company has started a force of men to work on their line. They will make extensive improvements and open up many new lines during the summer.

A petition is being circulated for the reappointment of Postmaster Dorn upon the expiration of his present term of office. It is being signed regardless of politics, as Mr. Dorn has given good satisfaction.

Robert Tohm, who is engaged extensively in the bee industry, says that his last year's supply is exhausted and that the demand is much greater than the supply. The output per hive is about \$7 per annum. This would seem to be good returns, when one takes into consideration the fact that a hive does not cost to exceed \$6, besides one gets from one to three hives from each colony during a season.

Some of the settlers who have filed homesteads under the supposed government ditch when asked what they would do to make a living while waiting for water, say they will go into the bee industry and harvest a crop thereby from their neighbors' alfalfa fields. James McCarty is demonstrating that this can be done very successfully.

L. E. Dyer, of Spokane, is here today in the interest of the Twice-a-Week Review.

A company is being formed here for the purpose of securing a tract of land across the bridge with the view to platting it as a town site. It is claimed that property in the present site is held too high and as there is considerable inquiry for town property a number of persons would invest in lots across the river. The deal is said to be consummated and the lots will be laid out as soon as the county surveyor can establish a definite corner to work from.

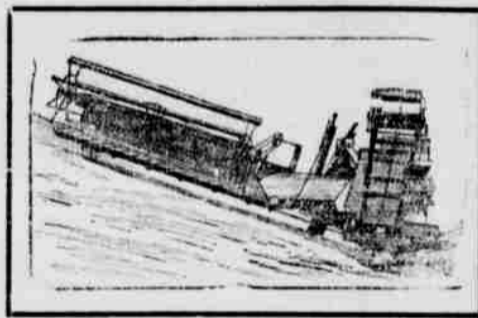

GENERAL NEWS.

Pietro Mascagni, the great Italian composer, sailed Thursday from New York for Europe.

John Muir, the eminent American scientist, is going to Siberia to study the vast forests there.

The British government will dissolve parliament this session and will hold an election in the fall.

The prefects of all the departments of France have ordered the monks to disband and close their schools.

In a fight Friday between the Bulgarian bands and Turkish troops in the Okherida district, 1,000 were killed and wounded.

Three students were killed in a riot at Salamanca, Spain, Thursday, as an outcome of a quarrel between the civil guards and the students.

Representatives of French financiers have arrived in Caracas and are making active efforts to secure a Venezuelan loan for the conversion of her debt.

In consequence of scenes of disorder caused by women students, the authorities of the St. Petersburg University have stopped the advance medical science lectures to women.

Members of the home guard organizations formed during the civil war, were not a part of the army of the United States, according to a late decision of Secretary Hitchcock of the interior department.

James Nolan, president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, has issued an official statement asking the members not to patronize theaters where "baboon-faced" stage Irishmen are permitted to be produced.

Germany has appropriated \$750,000 to defray the expense of preparing an extensive exhibit for the World's Fair, St. Louis, and a like sum will be allowed next year to carry the work to completion, making \$1,500,000 in all.

The Western Federation of Miners will hold their 11th annual convention in Denver the 25th of May. A movement is to be put on foot to make an eight-hour day universal in all the mining camps under the jurisdiction of the federation.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

J. L. McGinn, of Portland, has resigned as district attorney at Nome.

The prohibitionists of the first congressional district will have a candidate in the field.

Samaritan Lodge of Odd Fellows, in Portland, celebrated the 50th anniversary of its founding April 8.

Washington has the largest amount of cash in her treasury ever known in the history of the state, \$1,364,195.84.

Matti Jarvi, of Astoria, who is accused of killing his father, has been brought back from Alaska for trial.

Mrs. Emma Galloway, of Oregon City, is now organizing Lewis and Clark women's clubs in Willamette valley.

Over \$10,000 duty was paid at the port of Portland on the Oriental cargo of the O. R. & N. steamer, the Indrapura, Friday.

Portland Woolen Mill employees are to strike because the management says they must give up the union, now partly organized.

A twin egg has been found at Sumpter. Two perfectly formed eggs, joined by a tube of egg substance, is now on exhibition.

Hops in North Yakima are now being contracted at 16 and 17 cents. Over 50,000 pounds have been contracted at these prices.

Mayor Williams informs the women of the W. C. T. U. that he has no authority to close the billiard parlors of Portland on Sunday.

James Riley, an old soldier, and a noted character of Southern Oregon, fell down a flight of stairs Friday at Medford, while intoxicated, and broke his neck.

Reports just issued by Weather Observer Beale, of Portland, report the entire fruit crop of the state in a backward condition owing to continued cold weather.

The Alaska Construction Company has advertised for bids on 50,000 standard-gauge railroad ties to be delivered at the mouth of Soloman River, Alaska, by June 15.

Mrs. Rose Woodward, who deposited \$1,000 cash bail for Alkin, the Washington county man tried for killing a Chinaman, has received her money from the county clerk, on Alkin's release by the court.
