Particularly between the state feder-ations of Massachusetts and Georgia. the feeling ran high, for from these states came the committees to effect the compromise. It is instructive to see what changes a year has brought about. As every club woman knows, the great question was disposed of without a rippie at the Los Angeles convention, and today, Georgia is dedicating the March issue of the official organ of its federation, "The Southern Norman," to the Massachusetts feder. to the Massachusetts federation in token of her appreciation of aid received in establishing the Bar-ton County Model School.
